Addendum to my published letter: add Prisoners of the Knight to the list of Toronto and area cons that have been cancelled, a disturbing trend that I hope has solved itself. I was told that chair Dave Gracey got cold feet and cancelled the con, although what he needed were experienced people running the con for him. Many of us who have some con-running experience phoned him with offers of help, but he never returned any of his calls.

I wish we could have gone to Con • Cept '96, but finances just wouldn't allow it.

The Globe and Mail recently profiled Mark Shainblum and Gabriel Morrissette (any relation to Alanis, I wonder?) and it's great to see the success that they and *Angloman* have enjoyed. I gotta save up \$10 and pick up a copy.

TT9 (reviewed by Lynda Pelley) was an okay con for me. Fan-run cons are finding that interest in *Star Trek* is drifting, so more *B-5* and *X-Files* programming is being substituted. At Odyssey Trek in Niagara Falls, after the con lost Ethan Phillips as a guest, they got Richard Biggs from *B-5*, which may have saved the con right there. A *Trek* con with no *Trek* guests? We may have to get used to it, and *Trek* cons may redefine themselves as general media cons.

Yes, I would agree with the scientific study ("Sensors") that says that one out of every 10 Trek fans is maladjusted. This really is a nonnews report, one tailored for the press, who like to attack groups like Trek fans. I'd also expect that one out of every 10 people everywhere are maladjusted. Let's take the positive spin on this report: 9 out of every 10 Trek fans are normal, everyday



people! I guess that kind of spin wouldn't sell newspapers.

MonSFFA MAIL DELAYED

A glitch down at the post office may have delayed delivery of some of the club's incoming and outgoing mail. The problem has now been cleared up and we are assured that MonSFFA's mail is back on track.

RECENT MonSFFA MEETINGS

March 17

The club's March meeting drew some 35 MonSFFen while the city's annual St. Patrick's Day parade formed up on the street just outside our Maritime-Hotel meeting room. With Ireland's patron saint in mind, we began the afternoon's programming with a discussion of Celtic influences in fantasy literature. Guest speaker Cynthia Dudley, along with MonSFFA members Graham Darling and Marc Durocher, made up our panel and gave an historical overview of the Celts, spoke of their folklore and of how many fantasy writers have mired Celtic mythology in the creation of their stories.

As it happened, the club's Plant 9 From Outer Space video-film was fresh out of the editing suite and the group was treated to a special, small-screen sneak preview (Plant 9's public premiere would take place the next weekend at Con•Cept '96). Response was very positive and the folks who had acted in the production got an extra kick out of seeing themselves on screen.

Andrew Weitzman and Cathy Palmer-Lister capped the afternoon off with a primer on the works of Terry Pratchett, author of the wickedly humourous Discworld series, and Con • Cept Guest-of-Honour the coming weekend.

April 21

Keith Braithwaite and Lynda Pelley led off with a preview of the coming summer season's SF/F movie fare. They gave brief outlines of the movies (Barb Wire, Dragonheart, Independence Day and others) and offered their guesses, based upon pre-release buzz, as to whether each was likely to be worth the price of admission.

The remainder of the meeting was devoted to a look at SF/F film production techniques, amateur and professional.

Sylvain St-Pierre spoke of the importance of *pre*-production. Script, production designs, storyboards and detailed production notes, he explained, must be squared away *before* the cameras roll. These form the *blueprint* of a film project, giving you a good idea of what the final result will look like. Sylvain brought along examples of pre-production work for an amateur computer-animated short that he's producing.

Lynda then screened raw footage from the set of Star Trek: The Next Generation, illustrating the lengthy process of creating what would end up being a brief scene of only a minute or two. Perhaps an hour of footage was shot in total, covering many different angles to furnish the director with plenty of options, and allowing for the insertion, later, of special effects. The completed scene, as it aired, was shown at the conclusion of Lynda's presentation in contrast to the raw footage.

The screening of the *Plant 9 From* Outer Space "Making of..." / Bloopers reel gave the audience a look at how a minimal-budget homemade production is put together. While the TNG professionals worked their scene from all sorts of angles, the

amateurs putting *Plant 9* together kept things simple, permitting no more than two or three angles per scene, and generally keeping the actors to no more than a couple of takes.

An encore screening of *Plant 9* closed the afternoon's programming.

May 12

Mother's Day, not unexpectedly, saw a few less than our usual 30-35 in attendance.

Josée Bellemare and Liz Marcotte were up front during the first half of the meeting; the topic: PSI powers in sci-fi. The discussion centered on various, well-known film and television characters possessed of PSI powers (TNG's Deanna Troi, B-5's Bester, Star Wars' Luke Skywalker and Darth Vader), the ways in which their powers are given play and the challenges faced by writers who must be careful to sufficiently limit the powers of these characters for dramatic purposes. The debunking of versus the belief in such powers was also touched on, including talk of societal reaction—past and present---to persons who claim to be gifted with PSI powers.

Georges Dodds and Lynda Pelley presided over a lively discussion of genre heroes and villains during the second half of the meeting. Audience members cited favourite examples and those qualities which make for a great hero or villain were listed. It was noted that the genre offered few well drawn female heroes, more often presenting us with unfortunate stereotypes. Sidekicks and lackeys were also given their due.

PLANT 9 IN THE BLACK!

Sales of copies of the MonSFFAmade video-film Plant 9 From Outer Space have far overshot expectations and pushed the project's ledger well into the black! Sales of a deluxe edition of Plant 9's script added a few more dollars to the coffers. MonSFFA had expected to recoup some of the money it put up to produce Plant 9, but not even the club's most optimistic projections anticipated actually making a profit.

CONVENTION REVIEW

I give Con•Cept '96 (March 22-24) generally good marks across the board. That said, however, the con came up noticeably short in one, important area, which I'll deal with last.

Fan-Friendly Guests

Con • Cept's guests over the years have always proven quite congenial with their fans and this year was no exception. Guest of Honour Terry Pratchett-friendly, very approachable and of a devastating wit (not surprisingly!)—packed them in at his panels and held court less formally out in the halls. Pratchett, author of the popular Discworld series, is a pretty big name and the past few years have seen Con • Cept attract such A-level guests, a healthy trend which continues next year with fantasy writer Lois McMaster Bujold and illustrator Wayne Barlowe the scheduled headliners. A welcome returnee (he didn't make last year's Con • Cept) was the con's perennial guest and a long-time friend of Montreal fandom, Larry "The Doctor" Stewart, a rather unique fellow who never fails to amuse and entertain. As is their practice, Con • Cept's con-com recruited many local and regional SF/F pros and semi-pros, who were put to good use on the four tracks of programming running throughout the weekend. One of these tracks operated in French, run by the Boréal people. Con • Cept is to be commended for inviting the French-language lit crowd aboard; their participation brought a distinct flavour to the con.

Local SF/F Clubs Missed

MonSFFA was pleased to host a half-dozen panels. Our efforts were well received and our panelists had a lot of fun doing their thing. MonSFFA, however, seemed to be the only local genre club that was sponsoring any panels! This I found unusual; in previous years Warp 9, the various Klingon groups and others have always kicked in with their share of contributions to

programming. This year, for some reason, they were not represented. I don't know why they didn't take part, but their contributions were missed and Con•Cept would surely have benefitted from their involvement, as in years past.

Plant 9 a Hit

We must thank the Con•Cept programming people for slotting MonSFFA's public premiere of Plant 9 From Outer Space in prime-time, Saturday afternoon. Plant 9, the club's amateur video-film (completed shortly before the con), played to an enthusiastic and appreciative standing-room-only crowd. Within an hour of the screening, MonSFFA


members staffing our club table upstairs reported selling out the remainder of our stock of Plant 9 videos and scripts! Lead actor Graham Darling's appearance in the Masquerade a few hours later as his Plant 9 character drew recognition and laughter, confirming that Plant 9 was a hit with Con•Cept '96's attendees.

Some Con Features Downsized

On the subject of the Masquerade: less than a dozen participants, but some mighty fine costumes, including two crowd-pleasers from MonSFFen Nicola Stoeckert and Cindy Hodge. This Masquerade was modest in comparison to those of a few years ago and I noted that the Art Show and Dealers' Room were as well. I did not visit the Dealers' Room and so I can't comment on it first hand, but I can say that I've heard post-con grumblings about poor sales from some of the dealers. The Art Show I did visit, and while the smallest in Con • Cept's history, it featured a selection of excellent work. The local sci-fi art scene is quite robust if the quality of the pieces on display be any indication. The Model Competition showcased some fine work and hadn't down-

sized nearly as much as other of the con's features. The Saturday night Dance clicked with some, not with others; comes down to one's taste in music, I suppose. In my humble opinion, the DJs should have offered a more varied selection. The Con Suite, meanwhile, served up a wide assortment of snacks and drinks, and at reasonable prices. Well done!

Hotel Panned

Again this year, the host hotel's inadequate elevator service and convoluted layout proved frustrating for attendees, who at the bitch panel beseeched the con-com to move the con to a more user-friendly hotel next year. My information at this time is that Con•Cept is considering a change of site. Further, the con will move from spring back to its original fall dates in '97.

400 Attendees

Con • Cept '96 brought in something over 400 paying attendees, logged record room nights with the hotel (which helped to trim the con's function-space rental costs) and covered all expenses, with perhaps a small profit left over. Good numbers, in my view.

Media Fans Shortchanged

As I mentioned at the outset, the con came up noticeably short in one, important area: programming content for media fans. I've always held that one of Con • Cept's best features has been its broad-based programming, appealing to literary, media, fannish, scientific, etc. interests. Montreal's SF/F fans—the con's core supporters—are a diverse bunch, and Con • Cept was founded upon the principle that local fans be served by offering up a diverse spread of programming. Over the years, the con has, for the most part, given attendees a little bit of everything. This year, however, the interests of a considerable segment of SF/F fandom were woefully underrepresented. While literary, science and (particularly!) computer fans, as well as the fannish and vampire crowds fared well this year, media fans were fed mere morsels. There were not a handful of panels which focused on

Since the second "F" in MonSFFA stands for fantasy, I thought it might be interesting to describe Con•Cept from a fantasy angle. So put away your phasers and star charts and gaze into the crystal ball for a look at:

THE GREAT FAIR

For several years now, a group of people have been organizing a Great Fair on the Island of The Royal Mountain. People come from far and wide to gather in the meeting halls of an inn located at the base of the mountain, in the heart of the city. From times past, present and future, all kinds come: merchants bring their goods, artists and craftsmen bring their best work to put on display, and hopefully to win contests; storytellers, stargazers and dreamers—they all come to the Great Fair. Whatever their appearance, all are welcomed.

Over the years there have been individuals and groups from many different time periods. Knights in shining armour side by side with Klingon warriors, a princess from the future, royalty from medieval times—ambassadors from many different times, places and species. Some even claim to have seen dragons, tribbles and mechanical dogs over the years. Why not, it's possible!

Many choose to dress differently strictly for fun, in the spirit of the Fair. Some dress more elaborately and enter contests, hoping to win prizes and recognition for their craftsmanship and imagination.

After the fashion contest there is always a dance in the great hall and many smaller, private celebrations in some of the rooms.

Throughout the three days of the Fair you can see demonstrations of skill by various experts. Conferences on a great variety of subjects can be heard in the smaller meeting halls and ideas and opinions are freely exchanged, no matter where you come from or what language you speak.


Various groups have booths set up in order to make themselves known and increase their numbers. Some groups even take to the streets, much to the surprise of the local inhabitants.

So it doesn't matter what age the mortal calendar says you are, if your heart, your mind and your spirit are filled with magic and opened to the stars, then join us every year at The Great Fair on the Island of The Royal Mountain.

Below: Fans observe as artists create paper-plate art at one of the con's panels (DPK)




Model Competition: Star Wars' star droids in miniature, among the fine examples of modelling on display at the con (KH)



the interests of media fans. I don't think it unreasonable for media fans—no small group, remember—to expect a multi-interest science fiction and fantasy convention to include a respectable portion of media programming. Con•Cept '96 saw fit to offer its attendees a "Self Defense Seminar and Workshop"—what connection that has to SF/F is beyond


me!—but inexplicably, left Trekkers, X-Philes and such others with nada! I've heard some of Con•Cept's people, in essence, write off Montreal's media fans. While I question the wisdom of a con dismissing such a bread-and-butter market as media fans, I can see some merit in the argument presented that other local cons (almost all of them media-

oriented) are in a better position to cater to media fans. Con • Cept's people must have noticed, however, that while this might have been true a couple of years ago, it is not the case now, for those other cons are no longer running, leaving Con • Cept the only game in town. I think it behooves one of Montreal's first SF/F conventions—and now its only con-to offer programming that will appeal to as many of this city's fans as possible, and certainly to such a sizable, membership-buying group as the media fans. That would only be in keeping with the founding principle upon which Con • Cept was built.

An innocent Muppet is brutally attacked! But nothing is as it seems. Who was behind the dastardly assault? The truth is out there...somewhere. Two years later, though, after layer upon layer of devious plotting has been peeled back, the truth remains elusive and victimized Muppets have taken matters into their own hands. Warp(ed) reporter Josée Bellemare, MonSFFA's Muppet expert, offers our summer readers a follow-up on the crack(ed) investigative piece she published in Warp 32 (February '95). Now, there is, at least...

PROTECTION FOR THE MUPPETS

Two years ago, during a PBS pledge-drive on the weekend of March 12-13, on the Saturday night when the phones were manned by an out-of-town science fiction club—many of whom were Klingons—Elmo of Sesame Street was brutally attacked by Barney the Dinosaur! Barney was subsequently charged, tried and convicted.

One year ago, after an intensive investigation, it was discovered that Barney had only been a pawn in the attack and that the real culprits behind this horrible crime (for a while thought to be the Klingons) were, in fact, the holographic images of certain of the club members, including their president! Barney's conviction was overturned and he was set free.

The question of whether these holograms were acting of their own free will, or if they were under orders from the Klingons, remains unanswered. The holograms that were present on that fateful weekend have disappeared and their flesh-and-blood counterparts aren't talking.

Since then nothing has happened. Many thought that the whole matter was simply going to fade from public memory.

Not so.

We have just learned that in the past year Muppet Labs have been quite busy with several projects, all aimed at protecting Muppets at future PBS pledge-drives and other

public appearances.

First, in the electronics division, Dr. Bunsen Honeydew, with the help of his assistant Beeker and the vast resources of Disney Studios, has been working on a device that can neutralize the hardlight drive of a hologram's projection unit, rendering the hologram immaterial and unable to interact with anything or anyone. We were unable to get the details of how the device operates but we have been told that a portable, lightweight model is already in the works.

We have also learned that the medical division of Muppet Labs, in a setting that looks and sounds like it was taken from a science fiction movie, has been conducting genetic experiments of an even more secretive nature. Convinced that the Klingons were somehow involved in Elmo's attack and that they might try again at a future date, Muppet Labs has

been breeding and training a new breed of attack tribble. These tribbles have arms, legs, hands and feet, and a complete face but still retain that genetic trait which seems to render Klingons totally helpless. Their training, under the tutelage of Animal, Miss Piggy, Bean Bunny and other qualified instructors, has turned them into perfect bodyguards for Muppets: they look and act cute but the moment a Muppet is threatened, they spring into action with incredible speed and agility.

The Muppets say that they can't change what happened two years ago and since it seems that the law can't fully protect them, they just have to make sure that it doesn't happen again in the future. Whether these measures are enough to keep the Muppets safe, only time will tell.

REVIEWS:

This summer has brought moviegoers a big science fiction blockbuster and a swashbuckling fantasy epic. Our reviewers have a few quick words on each, along with an opinion on the new adventures of Doctor Who.

INDEPENDENCE DAY

This summer's blockbuster harkens back to those great old '50s alien-invasion flicks (War of the Worlds, Earth vs. the Flying Saucers), and would do '70s disaster-movie mogul Irwin Allen proud, as well. This is one spectacular movie, if nothing else. But hey, it's summer; who wants anything else? The sheer visual power, alone, of those strikingly composed shots of gargantuan alien spaceships hovering over Earth's cities is enough to forgive a film chock-full of plot holes, cheesy dialogue and forced oneliners. The waves of incendiary destruction that soon follow are just icing on the cake!

Don't go in looking for anything more than big explosions and testosterone-fueled thrills in this one, then sit back and enjoy the ride.—reviewed by Carl Phillips

DRAGONHEART

The CG dragon, of course, is the star of this movie and the reason most will go to see it. Certainly, the digital wizards at ILM have come across (as always) with a wonderful piece of animation built around the solid presence (in voice) of Sean Connery.

But Dragonheart manages to work quite well beyond its star critter. It nicely balances the qualities of a classic fairy tale with those of something more Disneyesque. Good acting, all around, and a fine message about those knightly values—compassion, honour, bravery, self-sacrifice—which insure that good be always victorious over evil.—reviewed by Susan Denham

DOCTOR WHO TY MOYTE

Not being all that familiar with the venerable British SF television series, I came to the new, Americanmade Doctor Who (aired mid-March, Fox network) wondering if I'd need to know all about the Doctor's history in order to follow what was going on. Turned out that my limited knowledge was enough, as producers were no doubt aiming to attract an audience made up of more than Doctor Who fans. I venture to suggest that a decidedly Americanstyle chase scene, and the romantic play between the Doctor and Grace Holloway (the story's female lead) may not have sat well with Who purists.

These elements worked just fine in my view, though, and while the plot was typically mediocre sci-fi fare, terrific performances by Paul McGann as the Doctor and Eric Roberts as the Master were the movie's saving graces. Standing out, for me, as a cheap shortcut on the part of the writers was the implausible ease and quickness with which the Grace Holloway character accepted all of the unbelievable goings-on that she found herself in the middle of. I would imagine that a noted heart surgeon like Dr. Holloway would be far more Scullyesque in her reasoning.-reviewed by Keith Braithwaite

PLANT 9 MEMORIES

PART II

by Keith Braithwaite

Warp editor Keith Braithwaite concludes his recollections of working on Plant 9 From Outer Space, the amateur video-film produced by MonSFFA members under the banner of the club's Ed Wood Video Project. Keith was writer/director of Plant 9. (Part I of "Plant 9 Memories" appeared in Warp 38, March '96.)

The shooting of Plant 9 from Outer Space took about 16 straight hours. Sylvain St-Pierre and I would take about the same time to edit the video-film, add music, sound effects, voice-overs and computer-generated special effects and titles. Unlike the shoot, however, we'd break the work up over a more leisurely couple of days and evenings (out the window by now was the original plan of completing the whole project in a

single weekend).

Before arriving at Sylvain's Laval home to begin our post-production chores, I had viewed the two and a half hours of raw footage in the can. I was checking, against the written record that had been kept on the day of the shoot, the order in which scenes had been committed to tape, the number of takes on each shot, etc. to be sure that the written record accurately reflected what was on the tapes (it did). This record would serve as an indispensable guide during editing. Sylvain, meanwhile, had begun putting together the opening titles using his computer's digital drawing and animation programs to full effect. He was just about done when I arrived, needing only the cast/crew list I brought with me to put names to credits.

Once the opening-title sequence was complete, we began stringing together the various shots, building our scenes in accordance with the script. Raw footage played back on the camcorder was dubbed down onto a VHS VCR. All of this went quite well, with only the occasional need to redo an edit—Sylvain's equipment is top-of-the-line and

editing on his machines goes very smoothly. The most time consuming part of the editing process is the locating of shots on the raw-footage reels—back and forth, rewinding and fast-forwarding. Because, of course, Plant 9 had not been shot in sequence, the collection of shots we'd need to make up a scene would often be found at opposite ends of our tapes.

Once we'd edited a scene, Sylvain's equipment allowed that we could enhance the soundtrack by overlaying a combination of music, voice-overs and sound effects, recorded on a second audio track. We made few errors mixing the sound, but the one, big mistake we did make more than offset our otherwise snafu-free work. After editing a particularly lengthy scene, we set up to overlay music and a couple of sound effects. We rolled tape, I brought up the music on cue and Sylvain stood by, ready to go with the sound effects at the right moment. What we'd forgotten is that we'd already overlaid a voice-over for a brief sequence within this scene! Of

course, when that sequence came up, the voice-over was erased, replaced by the sound we were now overlaying. We had to start all over again, mixing the music and sound effects, and the voice-over in what became the production's most complex sound overlay. We pulled it off, with only the slight hitch of our timing being just a little off-the voice-over did not quite match up with the visuals. We thought about trying it again, trying to get the sync exactly right, but decided not to, afraid that we wouldn't be able to come as close to perfect as we just had. In any case, as Sylvain pointed out, the slightly out of sync voice-over simply adds to the concept of a bad movie, Ed Woodstyle.

In a few cases, we had to improvise for shots which, by error of omission, had not been videotaped during the shoot. Fortunately, all of these were of minor importance and we were able to simply leave them out or use, instead, parts of outtakes or other shots.

Adept as he is at computer

animation for home video, Sylvain took no more than 15 or 20 minutes to create the individual CG elements needed, which were then melded with the raw footage during the camcorder-to-VCR dubbing procedure. There was one shot which I had originally envisioned doing entirely in CG-thus, live footage had not been shot-but which I now felt wouldn't look cheesy enough (!)if realized on the computer. We needed a quick few seconds, live, of a potato, aflame as it enters Earth's atmosphere! We had to rig this shot out in Sylvain's backyard (what must have his neighbours thought upon seeing two grown men videotaping a flaming potato suspended from the end of a pole?). But first, of course, we'd need a potato, a broomstick, some wire and some lighter fluid. Sylvain could supply the broomstick and thought that a small grocery store down the street might have the rest of it. Then he added, jokingly, that I might be taken for some kind of MacGyveresque anglo terrorist fashioning a homemade bomb if I walked into a depanneur and asked for a potato, some wire and a bottle of lighter fluid!

We wrapped post-production just a couple of weeks prior to Con•Cept '96, where we planned the public premiere of *Plant 9*. Most of the folks at MonSFFA's March 17

meeting had participated in the project and were eager to see the final cut, so we gave 'em a small-screen sneak preview. They loved what they saw (an encouraging sign), but Sylvain and I knew the acid test would come at the video's Con•Cept premiere, where the audience would include people who had not been involved in the production.

In preparation for the con, Sylvain dubbed a handful of sale copies of the video while I came up with a full-colour, Plant 9 promotional poster showing a space cabbage descending upon an unsuspecting Earth over the tag line "When the space invaders come, they won't be little green men!" I also put together a few sale copies of our script, in deluxe format, featuring complete storyboards and a copy of the poster. Word had come from Con • Cept's programming people: Plant 9's premiere was scheduled for Saturday afternoon, a prime-time slot.

MonSFFA's table at Con•Cept, of course, sported a lot of Plant 9 paraphernalia—props, a large-size version of the poster, the copies of the video and the deluxe scripts, and a Brussels sprout (miniature cabbage!) dressed up with alien bugeyes and antennae. We all talked up the video to the con's attendees at every opportunity, encouraging

everyone to come to the premiere. Sylvain had put together a short teaser, which we ran repeatedly on the TV set at our table.

As the hours passed and the video's premiere approached, I began to have doubts. Maybe Plant 9 wasn't as cheesy or funny or clever as I thought and hoped it was. I'd been so very close to the project that perhaps I'd lost my ability to objectively evaluate it. Project co-



producer Dave Legault seemed more confident, but tongue in cheek, he was hedging his bets. "If you like Plant 9," he was saying to people, "remember that I co-produced it. If you don't like it," he'd continue, pointing at me, "he wrote and directed it."

Finally, it was time. I made my way to the screening room. Sylvain

and I would introduce the video; we moved to the front of the room as a trickle of people entered and took their seats. For a few minutes, it looked like attendance was going to be pretty poor, but soon the trickle became a steady stream and we ended up with a standing-room-only crowd. It took Con•Cept's tech crew a bit longer than expected to set up

the projection TV and screen, so Sylvain and I padded our introduction. We whet the audience's appetite for what they were about to see, outlining just what the Ed Wood Video Project was, detailing aspects of *Plant 9's* production and fielding a few questions. Then, the lights were dimmed; the moment of truth had arrived.

Just minutes into the video, I knew we had a hit. I glanced at Sylvain and he nodded his agreement. The audience reaction was tremendously positive, better than I could have hoped. Everyone was laughing at the right spots and people were soon into the spirit of the whole thing, applauding favourite characters and delighting

in the no-budget special effects and our continuity errors, both intended and not.

Half an hour after the premiere, our stock of *Plant 9* videos was sold out! I'm told that copies have made their way to Toronto, Ottawa, Quebec City and Halifax, as well as to several U.S. destinations. Graham Darling entered the Masquerade that

evening as his *Plant 9* character, walking out onto stage to instant recognition, laughter and applause. Later, over a few beers at the Dance, Mark Burakoff told me that the comment he was hearing most about *Plant 9* was that it was too good to be classed with Ed Wood's movies! Mark and Berny Reischl, by the way, surprised us all with a special, *Plant-*

9-cast-and-crew souvenir lapel pin, which they'd produced for each person who'd worked on the project. John Dupuis would have liked to have been able to claim one of those pins. He had been offered the lead role in Plant 9, but had declined because he couldn't commit to an entire day of shooting. Graham took the part and now John jokes about being the Pete Best of Plant 9. He was certain that we'd be able to sell 50 copies of the video. I thought that wishful thinking, but John's sales projection may yet prove attainable—over 30 copies have been sold to date, with demand still healthy. (Those copies sold in the weeks following Con • Cept include a 20-minute "Making of..." / Bloopers reel, Sylvain having put this together using outtakes and the footage Cindy Hodge had shot of cast and crew at work.) CANADIAN WRITER SAWYER WINS NEBULA

Toronto-based writer Robert J. Sawyer has copped the prestigious Nebula Award for his 1995 novel, *The Terminal Experiment*. In addition, a film company recently optioned movie rights to the book.

Author of eight novels to date (two of them as yet unreleased), and a fast-rising SF star, Sawyer is Canada's *only* native-born, full-time science fiction writer.

CANCELLED!

Space: Above and Beyond and the quasi-genre series Nowhere Man will not return to the small screen this fall.

NEW SHOWS

Among the new SF TV offerings coming this fall: Dark Skies, an X-Files clone from NBC, Early Edition (CBS), in which a man is able to see tomorrow's newspaper headlines today, Homeboys in Outer Space, a UPN comedy, and Millennium (Fox), a new series from X-Files creator Chris Carter (see item below).

TREK VIII

Producers have decided on Star Trek: First Contact as the title of the next Trek film, eighth in the series, second featuring the Next Generation cast. Jonathan Frakes is directing and his Riker character, according to some insiders, is to be given a meatier role in the film, in preparation of having him fill Picard's shoes should Patrick Stewart decide against doing any further Trek movies (as rumours suggest he may).

The story begins with Worf biding adieu to the DS9 crew, taking command of the Defiant and flying into battle with the Borg. The Defiant is destroyed but Worf somehow survives and is rescued by his old TNG crewmates aboard the Enterprise-E. Picard then leads a fleet of starships in an all-out assault on the Borg. The battle ends with the seeming destruction of the machinebeings, but in fact, the Borg have entered some kind of time vortex and travelled to a past reality in which they rule the Earth, and have for hundreds of years! Picard takes the Enterprise-E in after them and the crew meet up with Zefram Cochrane (discoverer of the warp drive), enlisting his aid in defeating the Borg of this past to insure a future for the Federation.

Expect an appearance by Dwight Schultz as Lieutenant Barclay and watch for what is said to be an *impressive* costume/make-up job on the Borg queen. What you won't see: cameos by original-series stars.

Paramount is hoping to release the film in time for the U.S. Thanksgiving holiday.

PARAMOUNT PLANS "WOODSTOCK FOR TREKKIES"

Paramount is putting on a special Trek convention, dubbed Star Trek 30: One Weekend on Earth, in September to coincide with the 30th anniversary of the original series' premiere. The con will feature, among its many guests, William Shatner, Leonard Nimoy and Kate Mulgrew. The big show takes place in Huntsville, Alabama, and has been described by one company flack as a "Woodstock for Trekkies." Tickets for a single event will go for about \$30 while a full-weekend package could run as high as \$300 (this would include astronaut training sessions and visits with former Apollo astronauts)!

SULU TO CAMEO ON VOYAGER; DS9 WILL HAVE "TROUBLE WITH TRIBBLES"

The coming season will find Captain Sulu visiting the *Voyager* gang!

Also, DS9ers will interact will original series characters from the "Trouble With Tribbles" episode, by way of the same digital tricks which allowed Forrest Gump to interact with dead American presidents.

CFCF DROPS DS9

Montreal's CFCF-12 TV station has opted to drop Star Trek: Deep Space Nine from its schedule come fall. Star Trek: Voyager will continue to air. Both series have seen substantial declines in their ratings (continentwide) over the past year.

NEW DOCTOR WHO MOVIE PULLS POOR RATINGS

Ratings were not encouraging for the new *Doctor Who* movie, which aired on the Fox network back in March. Who fans, of course, are lobbying hard for more of their hero's adventures, but given the lower-than-anticipated Nielsen numbers, it seems unlikely that Fox will green-light any further travels for the Doctor.

ION PERTWEE PASSES AWAY

Doctor Who fans noted the passing away, on May 20, of Jon Pertwee, who played the third incarnation of the Doctor for five seasons (1970-74) of the popular BBC science fiction series. Pertwee succumbed to a heart attack while on vacation in the U.S. He was 76.

ALIEN: RESURRECTION

The fourth Alien film will star Sigourney Weaver, as a clone of the



late Lieutenant Ripley, and Winona Ryder, as an android enlisted to help battle alien hordes attacking Earth. A '97 release is planned.

CHRIS CARTER PRODUCING NEW SF SERIES

X-Files creator Chris Carter introduces a scary new SF series this fall, scheduled to air on Fox. Millennium stars Lance Henriksen (who played Bishop in Aliens) as Frank Black, an ex-FBI agent who heads a mysterious group determined to counter a wave of violence sweeping the nation as the new millennium approaches. Black possesses the uncanny ability to enter a criminal's mind. The pilot

episode will feature a serial killer who recites poetry and a strip club with walls that ooze blood and spit fire. Megan Gallagher plays Black's wife.

Carter concedes that his new show will explore some of the same kinds of dark themes explored by *The X-Files*, but stresses that the differences between the two shows will be greater than their similarities.

IN FIT OF MILLENNIUM MADNESS, FOX MOVES X-FILES TO SUNDAY NIGHT

Fox has made way for Chris Carter's above-mentioned new series by scratching *The X-Files* from the

network's Friday evening sked and bumping it into *Space: Above and Beyond*'s now vacated Sunday evening slot. X-philes are *not*, generally, pleased with the shuifle.

HIDDEN TRACKS ON X-FILES CD

X-philes will love this: Songs in the Key of X, a CD music compilation inspired by the creepy Fox series, includes two hidden tracks! Usually, unlisted, extra tracks are tacked on to the end of a CD, but in this case, they are positioned at the beginning. Listeners need to know they're there in order to access them. The liner notes offer a clue, pointing out

CUFF Fading Away

Canadian fannish institutions never die, they just fade away, and it looks like the Canadian Unity Fan Fund (CUFF) may do just that. Each year, the CUFF foots the bill for an Eastern fan's trip west, or a Western fan's trip east, to attend Canada's national SF convention, Canvention. Interest in and support for the CUFF has been lukewarm, at best, in recent years. Neither of the two nominees this vear received the necessary six sponsors required by CUFF's rules and the fund's current administrator, Linda Ross-Mansfield, who has doggedly stumped for the cause now appears ready to pack it in. CUFF could vel l be history by year's end; Linda's last-ditch proposals for the fund

include folding it and disbursing accumulated monies amongst various Canadian SF cons, with the request that the money be allocated to sponsoring Canadian fan guests. (Con•Cept concom take note: Linda's list of cons which might be recipient of CUFF money does not include Con•Cept!)

Maritime Sci-Fi Festival A Huge Success

Organizers of the Maritime Science Fiction Festival (April 13-14) can take great pride in having put on a first-time convention which attracted some 1500 fans! The Festival, we understand, was the first Atlantic-Canadian con to feature actor-guests. These included Star Trek's Majel Barrett

Roddenberry and Robin Curtis, and Red Dwarf's Robert Llewellyn. Also guesting: Canadian writer Ngaire Genge, author of The Unofficial X-Files Companion. Patterned after the now defunct Montreal Science Fiction Festival, the Maritime version's staggering attendance numbers more than doubled the Montreal Festival's best showing.

Klingon Civil War

Montreal-based units of KAG/Kanada recently suffered an unfortunate spate of in-fighting, the petty club politics becoming just too much for at least one "commander," Cathy Palmer-Lister (who also happens to be MonSFFA's vice-president).
