



Club mailing










Door-prize winner at Christmas Party.

ELECTIONS

For those of you, members or not, who were not at MonSFFA's most recent public meeting held on November 27th, club President Luke Fallon formally announced that January 22nd, 1989, the date of our next public meeting, will also be the date for the next club elections. The elections will be conducted by secret ballot and I, as Chief Returning Officer (CRO), am in charge of the elections. All regular members are eligible to vote, but *must* be in attendance on Election Day (remember to bring your membership card). I encourage all members to support MonSFFA by voting on January 22nd.

As CRO, I am accepting any nominations for the seven positions available from now until the day of the elections. According to those sections of the club's constitution, passed by the members at the November meeting, a life-form must be a regular member in order to nominate either itself or someone else, and must be a regular member in order to run for any position. Any interested life-forms contact me at 695-7982. Also, the tern of office is normally from January 1st to December 31st, but this year the term in office will begin a wee bit late.

As it now stands, neither Luke Fallon, club co-founder and El Presidente, nor I, co-founder and former Igor to Luke, will be running for any position because of other obligations. However, we both intend on remaining active members of the Board of Advisors (BOA).*

The following is a list of positions available, along with a brief description of each:

(1) PRESIDENT

The "Peep" is the club's official spokesperson to external groups and individuals, and BOA spokesperson to the general membership. He or she co-ordinates internal operations and, by approval of the Executive Committee, nominates either him or herself, or other Advisors as Recording Secretary, and Chairperson of the BOA. The President is the custodian of all of MonSFFA's official documents, except for financial and membership records (which he or she may keep on file), and is responsible for joint signing for the disbursement of organization funds, in accordance with approved financial procedures.

(2) VICE-PRESIDENT

The "Veep" assists the "Peep" in all of his or her duties including acting on the President's behalf in the event of temporary absence. The Veep assists all other officers in their duties and is also responsible for joint signing for disbursement of organization funds, in accordance with approved financial procedures.

(3) TREASURER

The Treasurer handles all the loot. Sound enticing? Wait, there's more. The Treasurer prepares the annual budget and any subsequent revisions, and presents it/them to the Executive Committee and general membership for approval. He or she maintains and is custodian of all financial records and documents, and (one more time!!!) is responsible for joint signing for disbursement of organization funds, in accordance with approved financial procedures.

(4) RECRUITMENT OFFICER

The R.O. instills in individuals love for the party and the state. But seriously folks...he or she instills in individuals interest in the club, processes membership applications, and maintains updated membership

records. He or she also works closely (ahem!) with the General and the Special Activities Officers in organizing recruitment events within general or special club events. Sound easy? Heh, heh, heh, heh!

(5) GENERAL ACTIVITIES OFFICER

The G.A.O. (Gayo! Ga-ay-ay-o! Daylight come and dey wan go home!) is responsible for the General Meetings, the Official Newsletter, and the Regular Mailings. He or she presents a plan for each General Meeting, any content or format change in the Official Newsletter, and any content and format change in the Regular Mailings to the Executive Committee for approval. It goes without saying that he or she is the laison to the exects for all three of these duties. By approval of the Executive Committee, the G.A.O. nominates either him or herself, or other Advisors to the positions of Mailing Manager and Newsletter Editor.

(6) SPECIAL ACTIVITIES OFFICER

The S.A.O. co-ordinates all activities not covered by the G.A.O., such as parties, conventions, etc. He or she presents a plan for each event and nominates any Activities Managers, if required, to the Executive Committee for approval.

(7) PUBLIC RELATIONS OFFICER

The P.R.O. works closely (ahem, ahem!) with the Peep, the R.O., and the two activities officers to promote MonSFFA in general and any of its events to the members and to the public. He or she provides a promotional package to any other officers organizing an event (given the officer approves of the package) and, by approval of the Executive Committee, nominates either him or herself, or someone else as Correspondence Secretary.

Dial-a-F.I.S.T. ?



But now, as I flip throught the pages of *Dragon*® magazine, I discover...the World of F.I.S.T.I. A new and strange way of playing role-playing games. Simply pick up your touch-tone phone and dial (in area codes 212, 718, 516, and 914 at a charge of \$0.60 per minute + toll charges) 540-FIST and "you can experience a dungeon adventure which **YOU** control! **YOU** make the decisions which direct your adventure by dialing numbers, as you compete for the **REAL GOLD** awarded monthly".

As if the Party Line wasn't enough? Sheesh. Steve; where did those great game ideas go to over the years? Ah well, another game marketer succumbs to the sound of money rolling in at the sound of the tone.

Palladium strikes it big with TMNT!

Palladium Books® has done it again with another marketing coup. Their introduction of the role-playing game "Teenage Mutant Ninja Turtles" a few years ago was at best mildly noticed. But now, TMNT has became one of the biggest things since sliced bread. With the introduction of miniatures for gaming, TMNT grew even more. Now it graces Saturday mornings with its own animated show, has its own comic book, and even now, a third party has licensed TMNT from Palladium in order to create a video game cartridge for the Nintendo Entertainment System. So with the release of the last rulebook for Robotech out of the way, Palladium has set itself up to be quite prominent in the gaming industry with Teenage Muntant Ninja Turtles.

BOOK REVIEW



THE FINAL NEXUS by Gene Deweese

The Final Nexus is the forty-third novel in Pocket Books's series of original Star Trek adventures and is the sequel to Chain of Attack by the same author. Sequels are nothing new in the Pocket series: Battlestations! followed Dreadnought!, and Time For Yesterday capped Yesterday's Son, which in itself was a sequel to the TV series's episode All Our Yesterdays.

However, the sequel format has its pitfalls and Gene Deweese makes no attempt to avoid them in this book. His most irritating habit is making vague references to events in *Chain of Attack* without providing enough to satisfy readers who either did not read *Chain* or who simply do not have total recall.

Deweese is also a name-dropper-or, in this case, a detail-dropper, liberally sprinkling references to various TV episodes throughout the novel. The dedicated Trekker will find that this practice tends to set one's teeth on edge, especially when the references are spurious and obviously designed to make the author appear more knowledgeable about the world of *Star Trek* than he is.

The Final Nexus has the Enterprise crew solving the riddle of the intergalactic "gates" discovered in Chain. Throw in an apparently malevolent entity which inspires insane fear in certain selected crew members, toss well with such hackneyed phrases as "Dammit, Jim!", end chapters with Dorothy-like lines such as "We are not in our universe anymore!", and top with the obligatory Vulcan mind-meld. Voila: overdone Star Trek formula writing.

Deweese does, however, have the ability to flesh out his new characters with few words. A refreshing element is the appearance of Commander Ansfield, a fiftyish engineer who has the distinction of being Starfleet Academy's oldest graduate without being a walking Geritol commercial.

Star Trek novel fans can only hope that number forty-four in Pocket's series will be more imaginative and action-packed than The Final Nexus.

THE SARGE IS ON THE ROCKS



- ST:TNG star Wil Wheaton, a life-long Trek fan, was thrilled to visit the set of Star Trek V and meet his idol, William Shatner. Observers laughed, but apparently young Wheaton was devastated. It took a bit of consoling from none other than Gene Roddenberry before Wheaton was able to return to work on The Next Generation. - The cast and crew of Star Trek V: The Final Frontier celebrated the completion of filming at a "wrap party" on Tuesday, December 27, 1988. The film is targeted for release in June of '89.

- Greg Morris, the electronics expert on the original *Mission: Impossible* show will star in an episode of the new *M:I*, joining his son Phil Morris, who plays the new show's--you guessed it -- electronics expert. Actually, by the time you read this, the episode already will have aired.
- The Spiderman movie, scheduled for release in Spring of '89, has suffered production delays of a couple of months. Whether of not this will push back its release date remains to be seen.
- Howard Koch's original radio script of the Mercury Theatre adaptation of *The War of the Worlds* has been auctioned off for \$143,000. The 46-page script is the only known copy in existence and was the final working draft of the renowned 1938 Hallowe'en broadcast. It is marked with handwritten changes by Orson Welles and by the CBS censors. The auction was held at Sotheby's and Koch, who had received a private offer of \$60,000 but gambled on getting more at auction, was obviously quite pleased with the final sale price. In 1938, Koch received a mere \$75 for writing the script, which took him 6 days to complete.
- Members of the Rod Serling Foundation unveiled a bronze plaque in Binghampton, N.Y., honoring the *Twilight Zone* creator. The circular plaque was laid in cement at a newly restored bandstand in Binghampton's Recreation Park, which was the inspiration for the setting of the *Zone* episode *Walking Distance*, which starred Gig Young and Ron Howard. (Born in Syracuse, Serling and his family moved to Binghampton when he was a child.) The foundation is also pushing to have the U.S. Postal Service issue a stamp honoring Serling. If they succeed, Rod will have gone from *The Twilight Zone* to the Postal Zone.

Fossil find: an ancient fish or lively imagination?

Two retired men from the St. Maurice region, pursuing their hobby of fossil-hunting, have found what they believe is the oldest fossil of a marine animal known in North America.

But at least one expert believes their discovery is nothing more than a chunk of old rock.

"We're in the middle of a scientific quarrel," Paul Garneau of Shawinigan Sud, who found the rock with Yvon Leclerc, said in a telephone interview. "Some say it's a fish, some say no."

The two amateurs — Garneau was in the grocery business and Leclerc was a teacher — have pursued their hobby haphazardly over the past year.

They think they found the fossil

They think they found the fossil of a lamprey eel in rock formed in the Ordovician age, 400 million to 500 million years ago.

McGill University is reported to have the oldest fish fossil found in North America. It's 378 million years old.

The discovery by Garneau and Leclerc came on July 23 in a quarry at St. Louis de France, near Cap de la Madeleine.

Dr. Yvon Globensky of the pro-

vincial Mines Department is one expert who says what they found is not a fossil, but just rock. "I saw it Dec. 14," Globensky

"I saw it Dec. 14," Globensky said in a telephone interview. His conclusion: The find is nothing more than compressed and eroded rock. It may give the appearance of a fossilized fish but "there's no biological animal there."

The rock is too old to support the claim, he said. Lamprey eels didn't exist between 400 million and 500 million years ago.

"This happens often," he said. "I had to go to Drummondville because a man said he found the head of a dinosaur. But the rock

was too young (to support the claim) and it had been sculpted by water over the years.

"To the guy who found it, it looked like a skull. He saw the shape, he saw the eyes — but they were just the results of water eroding rock."

Globensky is the only scientist, named by Garneau as having examined the stone, who could be reached over the holidays.

The experts may rule the find a dud, but it has whetted the fossil-hunting appetites of Garneau and Leclerc. "Before July, we didn't do too much," Garneau said. "Now we're much more interested."

'Sea monster' report a hoax

VANCOUVER (CP) — The "sea monster" that a retired judge saw in the ocean off his suburban Vancouver home was a hoax, an organizer for the Delta Polar Bear Swim says.

Judge Larry Eckardt said he was looking out the window of his Tsawwassen home on New Year's Day when he spotted the green monster in the surf of Boundary Bay.

The "monster" turned out to be an elaborate get-up worn by three teenagers competing in the costume category of nearby Delta's ninth annual Polar Bear Swim, said Ross Collicutt, the event's master of ceremonies. And Eckardt knew it, he said.

It was "just a little bit of fun," said Collicutt.


"He (Eckardt) knows he didn't see a sea monster," said Collicutt, a Delta travel agent.

Eckardt said he saw "something snakelike" swimming in Boundary Bay. He described it as "a sort of green creature with what looked like moss on its head."


Eckardt was not available for comment.

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NASA plane starts 6-week search for signs Earth is losing ozone layer

OSLO (AP) - A U.S. space agency research plane took off from Norway for the Arctic yesterday on the first flight of a six-week search for signs that the Earth is losing its protective ozone layer over the region.

The high-altitude ER-2 airplane owned by NASA departed from Sola Air Base at the west coast city of Stavanger, where the project is based, to analyse the atmospheric layer some 20 kilometres above the Earth's surface.

For several years, experts have warned that man-made chemicals, especially chlorofluorocarbons used in refrigerators and aerosol cans and in making plastic foam, are destroying the ozone layer.

Scientists at Sola say the Arctic hole appears to be smaller than the one over Antarctica, but could be more dangerous because it is closer to where more people live.

"The idea here is to look at what happens not only in the vortex, but what consequences it could have for the ozone at lower latitudes," Ivar Isaksen, a University of Oslo professor, said before the project began.
