All MonSFFA members in good standing, having paid in full their annual membership fees, are encouraged to participate.

MonSFFA elects annually a president, vice-president, and treasurer—who together form the Executive Committee—and charges them with the responsibility of running the club on behalf of the membership. These executives recruit advisors and appoint officers to assist them in carrying out this responsibility. On occasion, a second vice-president may be elected, as well, usually to handle an important, specific task, or to take the reins on a special project.

Our sitting Executive is as follows: Cathy Palmer-Lister, president; Keith Braithwaite, vice-president; Sylvain St-Pierre, treasurer.

Any MonSFFA member in good standing who is responsibly and reliably able to carry out the duties of office may run for any one of the Executive posts. Candidates may nominate themselves, or accept nomination from another member in good standing. Nominations are received by the chief returning officer, or CRO, usually just before the commencement of voting on Election Day.

Long-time MonSFFAn Josée Bellemare is currently serving as our CRO.

All MonSFFA members in good standing are eligible to cast a ballot. Members are asked to be present at the designated place and time in order

### **November Club Meeting**

The club's final meeting of 2016 was held on Sunday, November 20, and began with another edition of our semi-regular showcase, the Sunday Sci-Fi Cinema Matinée.

Fantasy adventures were on tap this morning, the MonSFFen gathered choosing from a list of movies that included The Magic Sword and Jack the Giant Killer (both 1962). The group opted for the very best, selecting for review the celebrated Ray Harryhausen masterpiece The 7th Voyage of Sinbad (1958), featuring one of the stop-motion maestro's most acclaimed creatures, the iconic Cyclops!

While some evaluated the story and script as old-fashioned by today's standards, this did not especially diminish audience enjoyment of the picture. Everyone classed the film a tremendously rousing fantasy adventure that pitted Sinbad and his brave crew against a bevy of extraordinary creatures brought to life in an amazing display of special effects wizardry and craftsmanship. All agreed that the movie stands the test of time.

Perhaps inspired by this Harryhausen classic, Keith Braithwaite and François Menard, during the course of the afternoon, completed principal photography on the club's own stop-motion project, a simple short film using paper cut-out dinosaurs animated against construction and crepe paper backdrops.

The meeting also saw one of our own, Shawn Picard, introduce to his fellow MonSFFen his own creative project, a recently self-published high fantasy novel, one of several he has penned and marketed online.

The group also kicked around a few programming ideas as the club began preparing for 2017's meetings.

Our principal presentation of the afternoon was by Sylvain St-Pierre on the topic of the dastardly villains of SF/F. Covering legendary bad guys from SF/F literature, comics, and the screen, Sylvain outlined the attributes of villainy and, along with his audience, explored our fascination with the likes of Dracula, Sauron, and Darth Vader. The best-conceived villains are not merely one-dimensional baddies with a penchant for violence, destruction, and memorable catch-phrases! And, they do not see themselves as evil, but are, rather, driven by some albeit warped reasoning or desire.

As always, we thank for their contribution our programme participants this day, as well as all those who helped to plan and run this meeting.

- ▶ The Star Wars community was rocked over the Christmas holiday by the passing of actress Carrie Fisher, best known for her portrayal of Princess Leia in the Star Wars screen saga. Fisher suffered what was described as "a massive heart attack" on a flight from London to Los Angeles. She was attended to aboard the flight and handed over to waiting EMT's when the plane landed. Rushed to hospital, Fisher succumbed a few days later. She was 60. A talented and wickedly funny writer who was well regarded in Hollywood as a script doctor, Fisher had struggled with depression and addiction much of her life. She mined her own experiences to pen the 1987 novel, and later 1990 screenplay for, Postcards From the Edge, the story of an actress trying to rebuild her career after getting out of rehab while living with her brash, opinionated, and domineering mother. The fictional tale mirrored Fisher's life in many ways, for instance her relationship with her own mother, Hollywood legend Debbie Reynolds. Sadly, Reynolds, heartbroken at her daughter's death, died herself the following day, reportedly having said shortly before she passed, "I want to be with Carrie." Fisher was cremated and, after a joint memorial ceremony for mother and daughter, a portion of her ashes were buried with Reynolds at Forest Lawn Memorial Park in Hollywood. Fisher's Star Wars co-stars and fans have expressed their shock and sorrow at her passing. She will always be remembered fondly as the brave, resourceful, defiant, take-charge Princess Leia, a role model for young girls everywhere. A campaign to have Disney declare Princess Leia an official Disney Princess has been launched by fans (the Disney corporation now owns Lucasfilm, and the Star Wars franchise). The "Disney Princess" designation has traditionally been reserved for the young cartoon heroines of Disney's acclaimed animated films.

#### **January Club Meeting**

The opened 2017 with a well-attended January 15 meeting. The afternoon's agenda was a busy one!

Keith Braithwaite kicked it off with an exploration of SF/F soundtracks and notable Genre film and television composers presented in the form of a difficult but fun game employing a range of classic sci-fi film music and contemporary TV themes and songs. The group was divided into two teams that took turns endeavouring to correctly identify, from short excerpts, the movies and television shows for which each piece of music was composed.

A selection of orchestral pieces, synthesizer driven electronic works, and pop music numbers employed as TV themes tested the group's knowledge of sci-fi/ fantasy/horror soundtracks. Throughout the game, Keith paused briefly to speak of such outstanding composers as Bernard Herrmann, John Williams, Jerry Goldsmith, and horror director John Carpenter, who scored most of his own films.

Keith also touched on the subject of SF/F themes, metaphor, and imagery in pop and rock music, inviting folk to identify songs and singers from a few lines of lyrics, a challenge that proved rather daunting!

The club also welcomed MonSFFAn Christopher Hammock to the podium to update folk on plans to relaunch the dormant local gaming convention Draconis, coming March 3-5, 2017, at Cégep du Vieux Montréal.

Danny Sichel gave a talk on the concept and attributes of gods, depicted in Genre literature and elsewhere, speaking of such godly characteristics as omniscience, immortality, and divinity. He compared the mythologies of the various gods with what science has to say about the universe and spoke of the relationship between man and deity, putting up visuals as he spoke to illustrate his points.

Finally, Cathy Palmer-Lister led a brainstorming session seeking to compile programming ideas and schedule presentations, discussion panels, and workshops for the club's upcoming meetings.

For their invaluable contributions to this first club meeting of 2017, we thank our programme participants, and acknowledge, also, those who helped to plan and run the event.

Several MonSFFen convened for dinner after the meeting, enjoying the hearty menu at the nearby Irish Embassy Pub and Grill.

#### **Powerless Brings Humour to DC's On-Screen Universe**

The newest superhero television series doesn't focus on superheroes at all! A light sitcom, NBC's Powerless brings much needed humour to DC's on-screen universe. The show stars Vanessa Hudgens (Sucker Punch) and Alan Tudyk (Firefly, Rogue One: A Star Wars Story).

Hudgens is Emily Locke, who is thrilled to have been hired as the new R&D director at the Wayne Enterprises subsidiary Wayne Security, a company that makes products for average folk, providing them a measure of safety in a world in which superheroes and supervillains regularly clash in and around Charm City. Tudyk plays Bruce Wayne's wastrel of a cousin, Van, who heads Wayne Security.

The residents of Charm City must constantly deal with the fallout of superheroes battling supervillains—smashed buildings, wrecked transit systems and the like—and have become weary of it all, even resentful that yet another superhero incident on the way to work is going to cause them to be late for a meeting or some such inconvenience. Emily has yet to grow so jaded and remains starstruck when encountering superheroes.

When Bruce Wayne decides to shut down Wayne Security because it isn't turning out any worthwhile products, Van makes no effort to save the company, seeing an opportunity to move back to Gotham City and climb the corporate ladder. But Emily motivates her motley crew of R&D personnel into developing a highly effective wrist-worn supervillain detector, impressing Bruce Wayne, who decides to keep Wayne Security operational.

Gently poking fun at the absurdity of the comic book superhero trope, the humour is quiet, unforced, and delightfully silly. The premise is the winner, here, something of a cross between the Steve Carell sitcom The Office and the 1994 comic book miniseries Marvels. The show also offers comic book fans obscure DC references and inside nods, like having Adam West provide an introductory voice-over in the pilot.

If the series remains true to itself, and its talented cast are permitted to develop their quirky characters, Powerless has a lot of potential.—review by Carl Phillips

#### **Briefly:**

- ▶ Battlestar Galactica's original Captain Apollo, Richard Hatch, has died. He was 71. The actor passed away on February 7 after a lengthy illness.
- ▶ Peter Capaldi is leaving Doctor Who later this year! The Scottish actor who has interpreted the Doctor's 12th incarnation since 2013 recently announced that the modern series' tenth season will be his last. Also departing the series at the conclusion of season ten is showrunner Stephen Moffat.
- ▶ Ben Affleck will star but no longer direct the solo Batman movie expected for 2018 or 2019. Playing the Caped Crusader "demands focus, passion and the very best performance I can give," Affleck contends. "It has become clear that I cannot do both jobs to the level they require. Together with the studio, I have decided to find a partner in a director who will collaborate with me on this massive film. I am still in this, and we are making it, but we are currently looking for a director."
- ▶ Born just down the road in Trois-Rivières, Canadian director Denis Villeneuve is fast becoming a star Genre filmmaker. His acclaimed 2016 SF film Arrival is up for eight Oscars, including Best Director and Best Picture. He is currently finishing work on Blade Runner 2049, scheduled for an October 6 release this year, and will follow up with a reboot of Dune!
- ▶ The next Star Wars film has a title, Star Wars: Episode VIII—The Last Jedi. The late Carrie "Leia" Fisher will appear in the movie; the actress had completed filming her scenes shortly before her untimely passing this past Christmas. Disney recently made it clear that Leia will not appear in the ninth and final chapter of the Skywalker saga as originally planned, not even in CGI form. The character's fate remains undecided at this juncture but producers will have to somehow explain her sudden absence from the storyline. The Episode VIII action picks up immediately following the closing moments of Episode VII. Caution: here there be spoilers! Leaked script pages suggest that Rey will be trained in the ways of the Force by Luke, much as he had been schooled by Yoda, while less reliable rumours have it that the mysterious Snoke reveals to Luke in a pivotal scene that Anakin Skywalker was his son, making Snoke Luke's grandfather! Meanwhile, Joss Whedon is keen to direct a Star Wars movie! Maybe the Boba Fett stand-alone?

Regarding our proposed May 14-club field trip, it has been suggested that we visit the West Island's Ecomuseum, a zoological park located in Sainte-Anne-de-Bellevue, on Sainte-Marie Road, just north of Highway 40. We might also cap the outing by taking in a movie at the nearby Collisée Kirkland cinema complex, and maybe follow the movie with dinner at an adjacent restaurant.

The Ecomuseum has recently undergone an upgrade of some of its exhibits. The facility features animals native to the Saint-Lawrence Valley, including deer, caribou, lynx, arctic fox, wolves, black bears, martens and river otters. A number of eagles, hawks, and other predatory birds are also on site, as are housed a variety of fish, amphibians, and reptiles.

Admission is reasonably priced and car pools might be arranged so as to allow as many MonSFFen as may wish to attend to do so.

Providentially, we have secured our new and rather larger meeting room at no additional cost and so have kept the club's room rental budget within parameters.

### Flying Saucers in February!

The club's February meeting boasted a special guest speaker, retired McGill University professor Don Donderi, who spoke on the topic of UFOs and alien abductions. Professor Donderi has been fascinated by the subject since childhood. He authored the 2013 book UFOs, ETs and Alien Abductions: A Scientist Looks at the Evidence, a few copies of which he had on hand for sale, at our urging; they were quickly snapped up and Don kindly obliged purchasers by autographing their copies.

To set the mood, we opened the meeting with a screening of MonSFFA's 2001 found-footage short film Encounters of the Very Close Kind, in which a few sci-fi fans video-taping their own fake UFO sighting using a pie-plate model, are interrupted by the real thing suddenly swooping in overhead! Don found our little amateur production delightful and seemed pleased to be among a group of people who, while not without a measure of skepticism on the matter, were generally open to the prospect of alien visitations, and even excited by the possibility.

His PowerPoint presentation encapsulated the essentials of a course he is currently teaching at McGill called UFOs: History and Reality, which puts forth that, beyond reasonable doubt, UFOs are real and of extraterrestrial origin!

He outlined the history of the modern UFO phenomenon, detailing a few of the better-known encounters over the years, beginning with private pilot Kenneth Arnold's 1947 sighting of a formation of UFOs over the Cascade Mountains in Washington State. Press coverage of this incident launched the explosion of public interest in UFOs

and debuted the term "flying saucer," which has been a part of UFOlogy's vernacular ever since. The famous 1961 case of Betty and Barney Hill, who under hypnosis recalled the missing details of their claimed abduction by aliens, was of particular interest to Don, who holds a PhD in psychology from Cornell University.

He noted that while he respects skeptical viewpoints and encourages the rigorous scientific examination of evidence, *he* has concluded that there is definitely something to all of this. While recognizing that some sightings can be explained in conventional terms, and that hoaxes can easily be perpetrated, in general, he believes the overall data collected supports the contention that UFOs are real, that they are extraterrestrial in origin, and that their crews appear to be catching and releasing humans, perhaps for purposes of study. There is certainly enough evidence, at least, to warrant further investigation.

The group quite enjoyed the genial Professor Donderi's talk, and the lively O&A that followed.

The latter part of the meeting involved MonSFFen in speculations on the society and, specifically, economy of the future. With automation rapidly displacing human workers, even today, what kind of a future can Canadians expect? Will we attain SF's utopian dream of a fully automated society without want or need, or are we staring down the barrel of a dystopia? Will there still be jobs for everyone in a future where robots are doing most, if not all, of the work?

Keith Braithwaite moderated a rather animated discussion of the ramifications of our rapidly evolving automated society and the future that seems to be developing because of it. Many expressed doubt that any kind of utopia would emerge.

Machines, growing exponentially in artificial intelligence and efficiency, will always be better and faster than humans, it was argued. We've already largely done away with assembly-line workers, bank tellers, and are now phasing out even minimum-wage cashiers in fast food restaurants! Automated cars and trucks are said to be just around the corner, which will eliminate the need for taxi and truck drivers. There will be fewer jobs for people in the years to come, it was opined, and without fresh thinking on the redistribution of the national wealth, resultant greater individual poverty. Also, those few holding all of the wealth and influence will not likely surrender control to those increasingly jobless and destitute.

But if all the money and power resides in the hands of only a very few, can a free society such as Canada's continue to function without resorting to some form of Totalitarianism? We may well see the end of Western Capitalism as governments seek to provide for everyone in a largely jobless environment. That sounds a lot like communism, some retorted, which has been tried already, and has failed. And yet, a country that cannot provide a decent livelihood for its citizens is unsustainable! We will *have* to find a way to provide a decent living for everyone.

The idea of a guaranteed income was brought up, but some wondered exactly how such a system would work, and questioned whether debt-saddled governments would even be able to afford such a program. Others noted that human nature drives our need to feel we are contributing to society in some substantive way. Life must have its meaningful rewards. So how will people contribute to the society of tomorrow, and will their efforts be considered of any appreciable value?

The spirited discussion could have gone on for another hour or more but time constraints cut things short as the afternoon drew to a close. We had just enough clock remaining to squeeze in a quick follow-up on the programming brainstorming session we had held in the hour just prior to the start of the meeting.

We thank very much our guest speaker, Professor Don Donderi, for his visit, and MonSFFAn Barbara Silverman for recommending him as a guest speaker. We thank, too, debate moderator Keith Braithwaite and all who participated in our discussion. Finally, thanks to those who helped to plan and run this meeting.

### **March MonSFFA Meeting**

The club met in the Hôtel Espresso's Saguenay Room for its March 12 meeting, which listed a rather busy schedule that began with early-bird programming, namely, another edition of our popular Sunday Sci-Fi Cinema Matinée, this day offering folk a choice of vintage SF movies featuring flying saucers. Our list included a couple of bona fide classics of the genre, The Day the Earth Stood Still (1951) and Forbidden Planet (1956), as well as the abysmal Plan 9 From Outer Space (1959), but folk chose for review the perfectly serviceable B-movie This Island Earth (1955).

Setting aside the usual sloppy B-movie science and stereotypical characterization with which such films are often imbued, the group was taken by This Island Earth's intriguing story and above-average visual effects. While most had never before seen the film, many recognized the Metalunan Mutant, a bug-eyed monster of 1950s sci-fi that is, today, an icon of the era.

The meeting proper began with Sylvain St-Pierre's presentation on SF/F's weird and wacky forms of government, spanning despotic galactic empires, lottery-based democracies, post-apocalyptic tribalism, and planets ruled by machine! Orwell's Nineteen Eighty-Four, Huxley's Brave New World, many of Heinlein's stories, among other examples, see real-world governmental structures and political systems—monarchism, republicanism, libertarianism, fascism, socialism, capitalism, anarchism—taken that few steps further, and sometimes to extremes.

Copiously illustrating his presentation with images from sci-fi books, comics, and films, Sylvain detailed some of the most bizarre forms of government that the Genre's authors have imagined, including one in which the chosen leader is dispatched upon completion of his term of office!

A quick break followed, during which we discussed a few items of club business and held our usual mid-meeting fund-raising raffle, awarding a number of cool prizes to lucky ticket holders, including premiere passes to the new film Life.

The meeting resumed on the topic of science fiction conventions, outlining, for the benefit of MonSFFen, upcoming local events and those in nearby cities, and comparing fan- and pro-run conventions.

It was noted off the top that SF/F conventions, or "cons," are currently in the throes of transformative change. The decades-long era of fan-run cons, such as Montreal's now-defunct ConCept and Toronto's Ad Astra, seems to be coming to an end!

These weekend gatherings, entirely staged by fans themselves, generally boast a few Genre writers as guests and feature a healthy schedule of hourly discussion panels, presentations, and workshops on a variety of subjects. Throw in the other typical elements of these cons, like a dealers' room, masquerade, art show, and nightly room parties, and you've got a lot of fun and interesting things to do, enough to keep the average fan happily engaged for the whole weekend! Such cons typically draw a quite manageable few hundred people, at most, a couple thousand. The annual World Science Fiction Convention—the WorldCon—is the exception, being the science fiction publishing industry's singular showcase event. Think of it as the Olympics of the science fiction field!

But the advent and proliferation of big, profit-driven super-cons, like ComicCon and FanExpo, is now threatening to drive traditional fan-run cons into extinction! Many of the smaller cons have folded in recent years, unable to compete with the big-budget super-cons.

While there's nothing particularly objectionable about Montreal's ComicCon, for instance, many older fans in particular have commented that such events, while offering unparalleled guest lists of major sci-fi screen stars and comic book luminaries, nevertheless fail to hold one's interest for long. Most can be satisfactorily experienced in just a few hours. These colossal events are, essentially, Q&A's and autograph signings, and a giant dealers' room, populated by tens of thousands of fans, many cosplaying as their favourite sci-fi characters, that, admittedly, being pretty cool. A few folk added that lately, however, some of these super-cons are beginning to get a little repetitive—same guests year after year, largely the same merchandise for sale.

Don't get us wrong! A ComicCon can be great fun, but at the same time a little bit disappointing, definitely exhausting, and very, *very* costly. And there's simply no getting around the prolonged amount of time spent standing in line waiting to get into the next Q&A.

Think of fan-run cons, if you will, as an intimate concert by your favourite band at a small club venue, and the big super-cons as a stadium show. Different experience, each with its merits, each with its shortcomings.

The afternoon wrapped up with a brief stab at completing our 2017 meeting programme, with panels and panelists slotted into the calendar for the remainder of the year. All subject to change, of course!

A nod to Keith Braithwaite for hosting another of his Sunday Sci-Fi Cinema Matinées, our thanks to Sylvain St-Pierre for his most entertaining presentation, and kudos to all who helped to plan and run this meeting.

## **Night Sky Guy Visits MonSFFA**

We welcomed astronomy writer/educator and life-long Star Trek fan Andrew "The Night Sky Guy" Fazekas to our April 9 club meeting to talk Trek and compare Star Trek science to real science. Andrew, a fan of the original 1960s series, in particular, asserts that, unlike other sci-fi TV shows of the day, Star Trek got a lot of the astronomical science right. Producers adhered to science fact as much as possible, he says, in creating their reasonably plausible science fiction storylines.

Andrew opened his presentation by outlining his interest—nurtured at an early age by his father— in both Star Trek and science, astronomy in particular. He noted that many of today's researchers, engineers, and technicians were inspired by Star Trek as youngsters, and that cell phones, iPads, and other modern electronic devices can trace their lineage back to the then-futuristic gadgets featured in Star Trek. Gene Roddenberry's inspirational sci-fi series served to instill in motivated young people a vision of the future that they have applied to the real world as adult scientists and inventors.

Andrew is author of the National Geographic publication Star Trek: The Official Guide to the Universe, in which the fictional stars and planets to which the starship Enterprise travels are compared with their counterparts in the real universe. The Orion Nebula, for example, could easily stand in for the fictional Mutara Nebula featured in Star Trek II: The Wrath of Khan. And Spock's home world of Vulcan may well have a real-life equivalent orbiting the star 40 Eridani A, also known as Keid. Some of the 3000 or so exo-planets recently discovered by astronomers resemble the earth-like terrestrial planets that Star Trek classifies as M-Class worlds.

Pitching his proposed book to the Star Trek people, Andrew was met with pronounced enthusiasm and described the whole experience of researching and writing the book in exceedingly positive terms.

A lively Q&A followed and eager MonSFFen snapped up sale copies of Andrew's book, which he graciously autographed for each buyer.

The latter part of the meeting was given over to a workshop on the sound design of our paper cut-out stop-motion animated film project, concentrating on recording sound effects for the production.

Keith Braithwaite began by screening of a brief primer he had prepared on the art of what is called Foley, that is, the creation of specific sound effects tailored to a film or television show. The process is named for its inventor, Jack Foley.

Keith then showed the group how he had "scored" our short film by cutting and blending together snippets of royalty-free music downloaded via Creative Commons, before he and François Menard set up a makeshift recording studio to capture the sound effects needed to complete our project.

Various MonSFFen sat before the microphone to mimic a variety of dinosaur grunts and bellows, which Keith then ran through sound processing software, altering pitch, tempo, or speed to arrive at a series of nifty "voices" for our dinosaur characters. A bath towel was manipulated to create the sound of the Pterodactyl's wings flapping. Strips of cut-up newspaper were bunched together, mop-like, and gently agitated to simulate the sound of jungle foliage rustling, and a pair of paper cups "walked" through a Tupperware container of dry macaroni feigned the sound of our dinosaurs' footsteps.

Keith closed the afternoon with a quick demonstration on inserting the various sound clips into the film's soundtrack.

We appreciate greatly guest speaker Andrew Fazekas' talk and thank him very much for visiting with us. We thank, too, Keith Braithwaite and François Menard for running our Foley workshop. And, a nod is given all who helped to plan and run this meeting.

Maulik Pancholy (30 Rock) is Shenzhou's Chief Medical Officer, Dr. Nambue, with Sam Vartholomeos (The Following) as Ensign Connor, a junior officer aboard Shenzhou. We'll also see James Frain (Orphan Black, Gotham, True Blood) as Sarek, and Terry Serpico (Rescue Me) as Starfleet's Admiral Anderson. Michael Dorn will *not* be playing one of Worf's ancestors!

## Stix Hiscock Joins Likes of Asimov, Ellison, Le Guin, and Chiang as Hugo Nominee!

A tawdry work of "erotica" was nominated for a Hugo this year! The self-published sci-fi parody/ dinosaur porn book Alien Stripper Boned from Behind by the T-Rex was penned by one Stix Hiscock, an obvious pseudonym that happens to be one of several employed by a woman writer who has chosen not to reveal her real name.

Her story is about a green-skinned, three-breasted alien stripper whose nipples shoot laser beams hooking up with a horny dinosaur in her spaceship! That's *got* to be up there with Clifford D. Simak's The Big Front Yard, Jack Vance's The Last Castle, Isaac Asimov's The Bicentennial Man, Poul Anderson's Hunter's Moon, George R. R. Martin's Sandkings, Connie Willis' Fire Watch, Octavia E. Butler's Bloodchild, Harlan Ellison's Paladin of the Lost Hour, Ursula K. Le Guin's Buffalo Gals, Won't You Come Out Tonight, George Alec Effinger's Schrödinger's Kitten, Bruce Sterling's Bicycle Repairman, Ted Chiang's The Merchant and the Alchemist's Gate, and Hao Jingfang's Folding Beijing, right?

The Hiscock story didn't win, but made the nominations list courtesy the politically motivated machinations of the Sad/Rabid Puppies, who as a group have, for the past few years, managed to game the Hugo's nominating system and have listed slates of stories by conservative writers they considered deserving in response to the nominations of too many writers they perceived as left-leaning. While these Puppies-nominated

candidates haven't actually won very many Hugos, the Puppies *have* succeeded in screwing with and mocking science fiction's most prestigious literary awards.

Alien Stripper Boned from Behind by the T-Rex did not win the 2017 Best Novelette Hugo; it came in last. Ursula Vernon's The Tomato Thief won.

# PREMIERE OF CLUB'S STOP-MOTION SHORT AT AUGUST MEETING

A good number of folk were in attendance at MonSFFA's August 27 meeting for the official premiere of the club's long-awaited stop-motion animated short film, Theories of Dinosaur Extinction: Number One—The Meteor Hypothesis. The film was released under the MonSFFilms banner.

This group project drew upon the talents of many MonSFFen, working on the production in 3- to 4-hour sessions every few months over the course of some two years. Shot on a multi-plane animation stand built especially for the project, the film's dinosaur puppet cast were simple cardboard and craft paper cut-outs. Stop-motion was employed to walk them through stylized prehistoric landscapes that were made from crepe and construction papers coloured with crayons.

Sound effects recorded by the group during a Foley session a few months ago were added to a selection of creative commons-sourced music to arrive at the end result, a humourous, charming little film that drew praise from the premiere audience.

A "Making of..." featurette is currently in production.

MonSFFA president Cathy Palmer-Lister surprised principal organizers of the project and the film's co-directors, Keith Braithwaite and François Menard, with a gift as thanks for overseeing the production; each received one of her lovely, hand-made wooden dinosaur puzzles!

#### **August MonSFFA Meeting**

MonSFFA resumed its schedule of programmed meetings on August 27; topics explored included the prolonging of human lifespans and the future of warfare. The club also took the opportunity to officially premiere of its long-awaited stop-motion animated short film, which deals with the extinction of the dinosaurs (see lead item).

Immediately preceding the meeting was unspooled another edition of Sunday Sci-Fi Cinema Matinée, on this occasion showcasing—naturally—dinosaur movies!

The MonSFFen present chose to review the 1975 Doug McClure-starring fantasy/adventure The Land That Time Forgot, picking it from a list that included stop-motion masterworks The Valley of Gwangi (1969) and When Dinosaurs Ruled the Earth (1970). B-movies The Land Unknown (1957) and Dinosaurus (1960) rounded out our list. Everyone recognized at the outset that while Gwangi and When Dinosaurs Ruled were undoubtedly better than the other movies on offer, most had seen them before. But they had not seen the McClure film. That, and the fact that it was an adaptation of an Edgar Rice Burroughs story was enough to sell it to the club members gathered!

While a reasonably faithful adaptation of the classic Burroughs tale, the film, proclaimed our post-screening reviewers, was not a particularly stellar example of top-drawer acting, and not at all a good example of special effects magic when it came to the realization of the story's dinosaurs, which were brought to life using a combination of full-scale models and mechanical puppets. There was no hiding the stiffness and obvious fakery, here, although to his credit, the director did try!

Despite its flaws, however, our crowd largely enjoyed the flick.

A presentation on immortality and the science fictional concept of extending the individual lifespans of men and women opened the meeting proper, with Sylvain St-Pierre examining his topic thoroughly from numerous angles.

The mythologies of most cultures include immortal beings, like the Greek god, Zeus, the Roman deity, Jupiter, and the Eight Immortals of Chinese legend. Fantasy, certainly, as well as science fiction are genres populated by many immortal or long-lived characters, from Dracula to Cthulhu, Egyptian high-priest Imhotep to the Elves of Middle-Earth, Dorian Gray to Lazarus Long, and Captain Scarlet to Star Trek's Q.

Man's pursuit of the proverbial Fountain of Youth was examined and novels and stories involving

immortality of one kind or another cited, such as Jonathan Swift's timeless Gulliver's Travels (1726) and the Faustian bargain that is Oscar Wilde's The Picture of Dorian Gray (in book form, 1891). Add to these Robert Sheckley's Immortality, Inc. (1958), Poul Anderson's The Boat of a Million Years (1989), Orson Scott Card's The Worthing Saga (1990), and more recently, Christine Amsden's The Immortality Virus (2014), to name a few. Canada's own Robert J. Sawyer has explored themes of immortality to varying degrees in his novels The Terminal Experiment (1995), Flashforward (1999), Mindscan (2005), and Rollback (2007).

Comic books, too, feature immortal (or virtually immortal) superheroes—Wonder Woman, Thor, Deadpool, Spectre—and villains—Thanos, Darkseid, Ra's al Ghul, Vandal Savage.

Modern medical science, meanwhile, *has* extended, and continues to extend, human lifespans. Men and women live, on average, a little longer today than statistically they did even just 20 years ago! Could a man one day achieve immortality by "downloading" his consciousness into a robot duplicate? Will a woman live on after biological death in the form of an online avatar possessed of her cognizance?

As the science advances ever forward, we find ourselves on the cusp of being able to manipulate our own biology at the cellular level in order to, perhaps, dramatically extend our lifespans! Might we, in the not-to-distant future, succeed in rendering ourselves, in effect, immortal?

The aforementioned premiere of MonSFFA's animated short film took place in conjunction with the usual mid-meeting break.

The day's closing presentation/discussion came courtesy Mark Burakoff, who began by projecting on screen an image of a rock, which one prehistoric man eons ago could have picked up and thrown at another. The second image put up was that of a stick, which could be wielded against an enemy. These were the first weapons!

Mark traced the history of weapons and warfare from early man to the present before inviting speculation on what warfare might be like in the future.

Affixing that rock to the end of a stout stick was the first instance of man developing a better weapon: the club. And sharpening one end of a long stick to a point gave him the spear, increasing the range from which he could strike at a target. The bow and arrow followed, and on it went, down through human history to the introduction of the horse as a mobile assault platform and the forging of the first metal weapons, to the invention of gunpowder, to the development of firearms, mechanized vehicles of war like the tank and the airplane, the utilization of the first atomic bomb, and finally, the deployment of cruise and intercontinental ballistic missiles, and the remotely operated combat drones of today.

Cyber-warfare will certainly be an important element of any future wars, Mark offered. And deadly biological weapons, the use of which has been greatly restrained since their devastating use in World War I, will most likely be deployed in large measure at some point, probably by either a rogue state or terrorist faction. Or, taking our cue from H. G. Wells, we might well attempt to repel an alien invasion from the stars by hitting them with the common cold, essentially harmless to us but probably lethal to them!

Who knows what advanced weapons systems a technologically superior race might unleash against us?—beam weapons of some kind that could melt our cities into slag in an instant! Or maybe an energy field that disrupts the atomic structure of its targets so as to simply erase them from existence! Or an invisible, catalytic agent that envelops our entire planet and converts Earth's atmosphere into some unbreathable mix of death-dealing gases! Or perhaps it would all come full circle, and like that prehistoric fellow pitching a rock at his enemy, an alien battleship might simply nudge a large asteroid out of its orbit and direct it at Earth! We'd have no more defense against something like that than did the dinosaurs against the doomsday rock that caused their extinction!

We thank our two presenters, Sylvain St-Pierre and Mark Burakoff, as well as Keith Braithwaite, who hosted our special dinosaur edition of Sunday Sci-Fi Cinema Matinée. Thanks, also, to those folk who helped to plan, set-up, run, and take down this meeting.

#### **September MonSFFA Meeting**

MonSFFA's September meeting took place on the 17th and opened with a report on the 75th WorldCon. Held in mid-August in Helsinki, this was Finland's first crack at hosting the event. Several MonSFFen had opportunity to attend and gave our group an account of their experience.

To the surprise of many seasoned WorldCon-goers, the event was quite well attended, with reportedly just over 7100 folk on site and some 10500 memberships and day passes sold. Historically, WorldCons held outside of major U.S. or English-speaking cities draw but a few thousand attendees. But Helsinki can boast numbers that rank it the second biggest WorldCon to date! By comparison, Montreal's WorldCon in 2009 drew just shy of 4000 and sold just short of 5000 memberships. Toronto's 2003 effort put up similar numbers.

As an added curiosity, our meeting's display table was festooned with souvenirs of the Helsinki WorldCon, as well as with unique Finnish candies and other treats for folk to sample. A few of these edibles were added to the mid-meeting raffle's prize pool, courtesy Sylvain St-Pierre, who had kindly picked them up in Helsinki for this very purpose!

Cathy Palmer-Lister, René Walling, and Josée Bellemare followed with a treatise on fairy tales, tracing their development from the oral traditions of old to the modern treatments on film and television, notably by Disney Studios. It was remarked that contemporary interpretations differ greatly from those in days of yore in that they've been cleaned up for consumption by children. The original tellings tended to be rather more ribald and violent!

Keith Braithwaite closed the afternoon with a game challenging folk to answer a series of questions related to selections of music excerpted from sci-fi film and television scores.

Thanks all around to our programme providers on this afternoon, and to those folk who helped to plan, set-up, and run the meeting.

#### **October MonSFFA Meeting**

MonSFFA's October meeting took place on the 17th and opened with the year's final edition of Sunday Sci-Fi Cinema Matinée, host Keith Braithwaite offering a slate of movies set in the Victorian age, or featuring Victorian characters. From Keith's list-Master of the World and Mysterious Island (both 1961), The First Men in the Moon (1964), and the more recent Time After Time (1979) and Pride and Prejudice and Zombies (2016)—folk opted to review Mysterious Island, which they found to be a perfectly entertaining sci-fi/adventure tale, complete with an erupting volcano included in the climatic scenes! The movie benefitted from the presence of several stop-motion creatures brought to life by master animator Ray Harryhausen.

This presaged nicely Sylvain St-Pierre's wonderful presentation on the Victorian Romance. This is an outdated term used to describe early examples of what we would today class as science fiction. Sylvain noted that, despite aesthetic similarities, Victorian Romances are not Steampunk, in that the latter imagines an alternate, retro-technological world, the former, a future as plausibly imagined by 19th-century authors like Jules Verne, H. G. Wells, and others, who extrapolated from the scientific knowledge of the day. Sylvain outlined in detail the contributions of these writers, and early filmmakers like Georges Melies, to the Genre. He touched, as well, on the real-world inventions and technological developments of the 19th century.

As time was running short, our planned brainstorming session on programming ideas had to be truncated, with MonSFFA president Cathy Palmer-Lister asking folk to simply write down their ideas for workshops, panel programming, etc. and hand them in to her so that she might collate the suggestions and begin to build a proposed schedule for next year.

We'll be discussing 2018 programming again soon, both collectively online and at a club meeting at first opportunity.

Thanks all around to our content providers on this afternoon, and to those folk who helped to plan, set-up, and run the meeting.

# Trial Sci-Fi and Holiday Craft Sale Quiet

In conjunction with the above-mentioned SF/F book sale, a Sci-Fi/Holiday Craft Sale was held. This was the club's first try at a craft sale, showcasing some of the handmade SF/F- and Christmas-themed treasures handcrafted by MonSFFen, wooden dinosaur puzzles, magic wands, jewellery, Christmas-themed knitted cat toys, and decoratively etched glasses among the items on offer.

### **Club Elections Upcoming in January**

The first order of business as the club begins a new year is traditionally the election of MonSFFA's Executive Committee for that year. These elections always take place in January, at our first meeting of the year, and are officially confirmed by the following meeting, in February. All MonSFFA members in good standing, having paid in full their annual membership fees, are encouraged to participate.

MonSFFA elects annually a president, vice-president, and treasurer—who together form the Executive Committee—and charges them with the responsibility of running the club on behalf of the membership. These executives recruit advisors and appoint officers to assist them in carrying out this responsibility. On occasion, a second vice-president may be elected, as well, usually to handle an important, specific task, or to take the reins on a special project.

Our sitting Executive is as follows: Cathy Palmer-Lister, president; Keith Braithwaite, vice-president; Sylvain St-Pierre, treasurer.

Any MonSFFA member in good standing who is responsibly and reliably able to carry out the duties of office may run for any one of the Executive posts. Candidates may nominate themselves, or accept nomination from another member in good standing. Nominations are received by the chief returning officer, or CRO, usually just before the commencement of voting on Election Day.

Long-time MonSFFAn Josée Bellemare is currently serving as our CRO. All MonSFFA members in good standing are eligible to cast a ballot. Members are asked to be present at the designated place and time in order to exercise their right to vote. Proxy voting is not permitted, except under special circumstances and by approval of the CRO (out-of-town members unable to attend the vote, for example, may have their ballots cast by the CRO in their absence, or make their choices via e-mail or other form of communication outside of the designated voting hour).

Potential candidates are encouraged to advise the CRO of their intention to run for one of the three specified offices as soon as possible.
