Club Elections

The first order of business as the club begins a new year is traditionally the election of MonSFFA's Executive Committee for that year. These elections always take place in January, at our first meeting of the year, and are officially confirmed by the following meeting, in February. All MonSFFA members in good standing, having paid in full their annual membership fees, are encouraged to participate.

MonSFFA elects annually a president, vicepresident, and treasurer—who together form the Executive Committee—and charges them with the responsibility of running the club on behalf of the membership. These executives recruit advisors and appoint officers to assist them in carrying out this responsibility. On occasion, a second vice-president may be elected, as well, usually to handle an important, specific task, or to take the reins on a special project.

Our sitting Executive is as follows: Cathy Palmer-Lister, president; Keith Braithwaite, vice-president; Sylvain St-Pierre, treasurer.

Any MonSFFA member in good standing who is responsibly and reliably able to carry out the duties of office may run for any one of the Executive posts. Candidates may nominate themselves, or accept nomination from another member in good standing. Nominations are received by the chief returning officer, or CRO, usually just before the commencement of voting on Election Day.

Long-time MonSFFAn Josée Bellemare is currently serving as our CRO. All MonSFFA members in good standing are eligible to cast a ballot. Members are asked to be present at the designated place and time in order to exercise their right to vote. Proxy voting is not permitted, except under special circumstances and by approval of the CRO (out-of-town members unable to attend the vote, for example, may have their ballots cast by the CRO in their absence, or make their choices via e-mail or other form of communication outside of the designated voting hour).

Potential candidates are encouraged to advise the CRO of their intention to run for one of the three specified offices as soon as possible. See the CRO in person at a club meeting or function; or contact the club via our Web Site at: webmaster@monsffa.ca; or by standard post at: MonSFFA, c/o 4456 Boul. Ste-Rose, Laval, Québec, Canada, H7R 1Y6. Mark any correspondence to the attention of the CRO.

IMPORTANT; please take note: MonSFFA has moved its monthly meetings from Sundays to Saturdays!

Sitting Executive Returned to Office for 2018

The first MonSFFA meeting of 2018 saw the club hold its annual elections for our three executive positions—president, vice-president, and treasurer—members present opting for experience and returning the 2017 slate to office for another year.

The freshly returned Executive was immediately faced with a renegotiation of our function-space contract with the Hôtel Espresso, necessitated by a change to the hotel's schedule which left us without an available meeting room on Sundays. (See lead item "Club Meetings Move to Saturdays!")

We wish the Executive well as they tackle this, and the other complications and sundry tasks of organizing the club's operations for the coming year. Congratulations on their re-election are proffered Cathy Palmer-Lister, president, Keith Braithwaite, vice-president, and Sylvain St-Pierre, treasurer.

Note that Cathy and Keith will be pinch-hitting for Sylvain, handling the duties of treasurer for the first couple months of the year as he attends to a pressing family matter which will, unfortunately, keep him from attending our meetings and events for a time. We look forward to his eventual return.

January MonSFFA Meeting

We began 2018 with a look at the life and works of H. P. Lovecraft. François Menard, with input from Keith Braithwaite, outlined the pioneering supernatural horror writer's personal history, listing and offering commentary, too, on his major works, which include his Dream Cycle and famous Cthulhu Mythos stories.

A troubled individual, Howard Phillips Lovecraft (1890-1937) experienced a number of family tragedies during his life, including the death of his father when Lovecraft was only 8 years old, and the mental illnesses of both his father and mother. Lovecraft himself endured nervous breakdowns and died impoverished at the age of 46, his seminal works of weird fiction largely unrecognized in his lifetime. But he was hugely influential to many of the 20th century's premiere horror and science fiction/fantasy writers and Genre filmmakers, among them Ramsey Campbell, Stephen King, Clive Barker, Neil Gaiman, Alan Moore, Mike Mignola, Steven Spielberg, John Carpenter, and Guillermo del Toro.

Influenced himself by 19th- and early 20th-century dark fantasy and horror writers such as Edgar Allan Poe, Lord Dunsany, Arthur Machen, and Algernon Blackwood, and by his own nightmares—his grandfather would tell him Gothic horror stories as a child—Lovecraft employed an engaging, archaic style to write of dark, forbidden knowledge uncovered, of powerful ancient and malevolent entities and the insignificance of man in this vast cosmos, of civilization under threat from horrid barbarism, of inexorable fate and inherited guilt, and most controversially, of class and race (his disparaging views of immigrants and non-whites were xenophobic and decidedly racist).

Lovecraft was an avid participant in the amateur journalism movement, a member of the United Amateur Press Association, and corresponded extensively on a variety of topics with other writers of his day—Conan creator Robert E. Howard, Frank Belknap Long, Clark Ashton Smith, August Derleth, Fritz Leiber, and Robert Block among them. This group became known as the Lovecraft Circle, penning stories set in Lovecraft's universe, with Lovecraft's blessing and encouragement.

Keith Braithwaite screened numerous trailers for some of the cinematic adaptations of Lovecraft's stories, including director Stuart Gordon's handful of films, Re-Animator (1985) probably his best known. Rod Serling's anthology series Night Gallery (1969-1973) included an adaptation of the story Pickman's Model, and a couple of recent independent productions distributed by the H. P. Lovecraft Historical Society were made to appear as if produced in Lovecraft's 1920s-1930s era. Oddly, no Lovecraft story has yet been adapted to film as an A-list, big-budget movie, although director Guillermo del Toro has been talking in recent years of filming the novella At the Mountains of Madness.

The latter part of the afternoon saw the club's election of its Executive Committee for the coming year (see previous item) and the finalizing of 2018 meeting programming. The planned presentation A Personal Journey was postponed until February's meeting.

We thank for their efforts all involved in the planning and staging of this meeting.

Briefly:

▶ We were, regrettably, unable to get a paper version of January's Impulse printed and mailed in a timely manner last month. We apologize for this shortcoming. Fortunately, the electronic version *was* released as usual, and available. Paper copies of both the January and February issues will be on hand at our February meeting.

February MonSFFA Meeting

February's well-attended meeting boasted a busy agenda!

We opened with the year's first edition of the now renamed *Saturday* Sci-Fi Cinema Matinée, featuring movies starring notable sexy sirens of science fiction and fantasy, like Zsa Zsa Gabor, Jane Fonda, Raquel Welch, and the unitard-clad Hollywood Cover Girls, featured in, respectively, The Queen of Outer Space (1958), Barbarella (1968), One Million Years, B. C. (1966), and Cat-Women of the Moon (1953)! Our fifth film offering, and the one chosen by the group for review, was the cheesy 1973 sci-fi sexploitation gem Invasion of the Bee Girls, starring Victoria Vetri and Anitra Ford. MonSFFen found the film mildly entertaining, in a so-bad-it's-good kind of way, and very much of its period.

All of this tied in nicely to our lead panel topic,

sex and love in the society of the future. Yves Tousignant and Keith Braithwaite were our panellists, here, engaging their audience in a wide-ranging discussion of emerging trends surrounding sex and love in our increasingly technological society, and the future that may develop as a consequence. Discussed were the impact of the Web and social media on modern relationships; the explosive growth of increasingly violent pornography and the consequent detrimental views of sex engendered in today's youth; the decline of traditional institutions such as marriage and the eroding of monogamy as society's default setting with regard to relationships; and virtual sex and how the advent of "sex robots" on par with those depicted in science fiction may well unintentionally wreck human civilization—with all of one's fantasies fulfilled, would anyone ever again come out of their basements?—or conversely, save it! The feasibility of human-alien couplings, a common trope of science fiction, was touched upon, too, as were some of the many representations of sex and love in SF/F.

Afterwards, everyone smoked a cigarette.

Among other brief video clips of interest to the group, the meeting witnessed the screening of a featurette on the production of the club's recently released stop-motion animation project, a short film starring cardboard cut-out dinosaur puppets. The scheduled slide-show presentation A Personal Journey, highlighting a club member's years-long involvement with MonSFFA and the fun and satisfaction it has brought him, was regrettably, again postponed, to a date later to be determined.

The closing hour or so of the meeting was given over to a sci-fi game put together by Danny Sichel and very loosely based on the popular board game Balderdash. Players were given the actual title of an obscure or oddly titled SF/F story, then asked to pen a quick fake outline of the story. These were then read aloud, along with the story's genuine summary, and folk were challenged to identify which was the true synopsis, scoring points if they did, or if their fake run-down fooled others. Lots of fun!

We thank our panellists for their efforts, as well as all involved in the planning and running of this meeting.

Briefly:

► Usually seen as harbingers of bad luck, black cats seem to be themselves experiencing a run of good luck as a result of Marvel's critically acclaimed Black Panther movie. Reportedly, the adoption of black cats has seen a marked increase since the film's release! Black Panther is breaking box office records all over the place and has now racked up domestic box-office receipts that put it in third place as a top money-maker amongst MCU movies, behind only Avengers and Age of Ultron. Meow, meow! (Translation: Wakanda forever!)

► Green-lighted by Netflix is a fresh take on Sabrina, the Teenage Witch, inspired, no doubt, by the recent success of the CW's Riverdale, television's new, dark, edgy interpretation of the classic Archie comics. Two seasons of Sabrina have been ordered; look for it to premiere in late-2018. Both shows are based on the Afterlife with Archie comic book series by writer Roberto Aguirre-Sacasa and artist Robert Hack. Aguirre-Sacasa is an executive producer and writer on both Riverdale and Sabrina.

▶ With the action set to unfold over 60 years after the WWI-set first film, the planned Wonder Woman sequel will feature classic Wonder Woman antagonist Cheetah—the post-Crisis version of the character, cursed archeologist Dr. Barbara Ann Minerva—as chief villain. Kristen Wiig is said to be favoured to play Diana's feline foe. A release date of November 1, 2019 has been announced.

► Things will be getting stranger yet again for the residents of Hawkins, Indiana; Netflix has confirmed that an 8-episode third season of its popular 1980s-set sci-fi/horror series Stranger Things is coming in late-2018 or early-2019.

► Trekkers will be pleased to hear that Star Trek: Discovery and Trek parody The Orville have each been renewed for a second season. MonSFFA will evaluate and compare these two shows at our March 10 meeting.

MARCH MonSFFA MEETING WELCOMES **GUEST SPEAKERS**

MonSFFA's March 10 meeting welcomed two special guests on the topic of women in SF/F. Multi-award-winning SF/F author Jo Walton and social activist and a writer new to the Genre, Su Sokol, took their seats at the dais before a packed room

Following an introductory video presentation briefly outlining the history of, and biases faced by pioneering women SF/F writers and early female stars of the Genre, moderator Keith Braithwaite opened the discussion by asking of the guests what drew them to the Genre to begin with, and who they thought were the female equivalents of SF/F's so-called "Big Three"—Asimov, Bradbury, and Clarke, along with Heinlein and other of the Genre's best known male writers?

It was immediately noted that these male writers are dead and no longer selling! Many of the best-selling and award-winning Genre writers today, in fact, are women. So has gender equality been achieved, then? What of the instances of sexism endured by the precursors of today's stable of very talented and capable female science fiction and fantasy writers? Do such instances continue to occur, today?

Things are better than they were, to be sure, but there's still a ways to go. Gay and transgendered issues reflected in some of modern sci-fi are seeing more push-back of late than are the old battles fought by earlier generations of women SF/F writers trying to break into the field. This brought up the recent controversies surrounding the Hugo nominations and the politically-charged arguments advanced by such groups as the "Sad Puppies," who yearn for the square-jawed science fiction of old and feel that those kinds of stories are being overlooked by a cabal of politically correct writers and activist fans who are supposedly asserting a leftist agenda.

Members of the audience were invited to chime in with their thoughts and questions.

Touched upon, too, was the then-common practise of women writers using gender non-specific pen names-C. L. Moore, C. J. Cherryh, J. K. Rowling-to mask their femininity because, they were apparently told, sales would suffer if the author of a sci-fi piece was known to be a woman! Su read aloud Robert Silverberg's humble admission of error regarding the gender of James Tiptree, Jr., who, it turned out, was a woman! Alice Bradley Sheldon wrote under the pseudonym James Tiptree, Jr. Silverberg had previously been confident, in print no less, that of course Tiptree, Jr. was a man, and that you'd have to be balmy to think otherwise! Jo clarified on the story regarding Cherryh, who it goes was cautioned by her first editor that she should change her surname because it sounded too much like that of a romance writer. But there actually was such a writer named Cherry, Jo explained, so Carolyn Janice Cherry added the "h" to her surname so as to differentiate herself from that other writer.

Our guests also illuminated the group on the *craft* of writing, touching on what influences their work, on building a realistic character, the ins and outs of the publishing business, and such.

The discussion closed with Jo and Su speaking of their latest projects, and signing a few books for enthusiastic fans. MonSFFA thanks them both for taking the time to share their thoughts with our membership.

The second half of the meeting saw an open discussion comparing two new TV shows, Star Trek: Discovery and the Trek parody The Orville.

Keith again moderated, joined at the dais by Francois Menard, Paula Dufour, Leslie Perryon, and Joe Aspler. Most found that, while not quite living up to what they promised, the shows were nonetheless entertaining. The panel and audience together dissected the just-completed first seasons of each show.

Discovery is fairly well written and acted, but relies on old Star Trek tropes like the Federation-Klingon conflict and the Mirror Universe to tell its story, despite the advertised promise of a return to the spirit of the original 1960s series. There was rather little exploring of strange new worlds or seeking out of new life and new civilizations involved! And while The Orville was sold as a send-up of Trek infused with frat-boy humour, it hasn't proven quite as funny as that would suggest. It doesn't seem to know if it wants to be a comedy or a science fiction series, and as such, it's an odd hybrid of both that doesn't quite satisfy as either. It is definitely an homage to TNG, however! And it did get better as the season progressed.

Thanks, again, to our guests, Jo Walton and Su Sokol, and to all of our panelists on this afternoon, as well as to those who helped to plan and run this meeting.

in recent years for necessary renovations to the building housing the museum's exhibits, the fully refurbished and updated CSTM, today, is again open and welcoming visitors! And the balance- taxing Crazy Kitchen, dating back to the museum's opening in 1967, is still a part of it all!

Featured at the CSTM this summer is The Art of the Brick, a Lego exhibition. Renowned Lego builder/artist Nathan Sawaya's work is on display, here, showcasing original pieces as well as recreations of world famous works of art like Michelangelo's David, Da Vinci's Mona Lisa, and Van Gogh's Starry Night. Also on show is a full-sized Lego T-Rex skeleton, made of over 80,000 bricks! *And*, the so-called "Block Party" interactive build space allows visitors to test their own creativity with Lego! Information for our carpool drivers:

The Canada Science and Technology Museum is located at 1867 St-Laurent Boulevard, Ottawa (a short jaunt south of Highway 417).

From Montreal, follow Highway 40 West off the island into Vaudreuil-Dorion, bearing right when the road forks at exit 32 towards Ottawa. Continue on Highway 40 (Trans-Canada Highway) until the Quebec-Ontario border; the 40 becomes Highway 417.

Follow the 417 for roughly 110 kilometres into Ottawa. Exit at Innes Road (Exit 112), turning west (left) on Innes and continuing for about 2.5 kilometres to St-Laurent Boulevard. Turn left onto St-Laurent and drive a short distance, past a McDonald's and a Burger King, until the intersection of Lancaster Road. Turn left onto Lancaster and proceed to the CSTM parking lot entrance.

We will meet just outside the museum's main entrance before proceeding inside.

April MonSFFA Meeting

April's club meeting got off to an early start with a superhero edition of Saturday Sci-Fi Cinema Matinée, the assembled MonSFFen passed on movies featuring Wonder Woman, Batman and Robin, Captain America, and a Russian superhero team, choosing, rather, to review the 1951 black-and-white adventure Superman and the Mole Men, starring George Reeves. This first ever Superman theatrical feature film was later recut as a two-part episode of Reeves' Adventures of Superman TV series, for which this movie served as a pilot of sorts. The movie was well received by our group, who found it dated, of course, but an entertaining and well made, low-budget effort. The camera trickery employed to give Superman flight and showcase his other super powers were simple but effective, it was noted.

The meeting proper opened with a quick discussion on the popular appeal of the superhero, moderator Keith Braithwaite opining that comic book superheroes are the modern equivalent of the gods of Greek and Roman mythology. Folk chimed in with their own observations, speaking of superheroes as representative of the ideals to which we individually and collectively aspire, as metaphors for our always changing societal values, and as role models for awkward, skinny adolescent boys (and girls!) who wish for the same impossible bravery, strength, and virtue in the face of adversity (read: high school or family crisis or just plain life in general!) as their comic book idols.

A lively and decidedly tongue-in-cheek "debate" pitted Marvel fans Paula Dufour and Marc Durocher against DC fans René Walling and Keith. François Menard moderated, here, testing the debaters with demanding questions on arcane aspects of the Marvel and DC universes, and pitting favourite characters from each against the other to determine who might prevail! It was all in good fun, with the audience commenting on the debaters' arguments and voting on the winners of each round as the debate progressed. In the end, François called it, overall, a tie!

Supported by numerous visuals in illustration of his treatise, Keith remained at the dais to offer a PowerPoint presentation on the evolution of comic book art, specifically through the lens of Golden and Silver Age Superman artists—many of them largely unsung—beginning with co-creator Joe Shuster, who in the mid-1930s with partner Jerry Siegel, laid the foundation for the world's most enduring superhero. Keith explained that the printing processes of the day necessitated a particular stylized approach to comic book art, and spoke, too, of the collaborative effort of many artists—writers, layout artists, pencillers, inkers, letterers, colourists—that is required to create a comic book.

The film is now the highest-grossing superhero movie of all time, the most successful comic book film adaptation ever, and the highest-grossing MCU movie of the bunch! It has surpassed Star Wars: The Force Awakens as the movie to most quickly reach \$1 billion in worldwide receipts, managing the feat in just 11 days! As of this writing, Infinity War has taken in over \$1.6 billion! ▶ Genre TV series wrapping up this season or cancelled include: Once Upon a Time, The Crossing, and, not surprisingly, Inhumans on ABC; The Last Man on Earth, The Exorcist, The X-Files, and Lucifer on Fox; and The Originals on The CW. Both late-'90s-early-2000s series Charmed and Roswell (as Roswell, New Mexico) are rebooting on The CW. ▶ Finally, we remind MonSFFen that regular cash flow is vital to the continued financing of our activities. 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Field Trip More Than Just Another Brick in the Wall!

MonSFFA undertook as our summer excursion a field trip to Canada's Science and Technology Museum in Ottawa on Saturday, June 9.

The venerable Science and Technology Museum has for decades been a destination of choice for school field trips or family excursions. Closed in recent years for necessary renovations to the building housing the museum's exhibits, the now refurbished and updated CSTM is again open and welcoming visitors! And the balancechallenging Crazy Kitchen, dating back to the museum's opening in 1967, is still a part of it all!

We found the museum to be a wonderful collection of artifacts tracing the progression of technology in Canada through the years, from tiny vacuum tubes and transistors to massive radio-telescopes (the latter in scale-model form, here), children's bicycles to giant, powerful steam-powered train locomotives, children's toys to family recreational vehicles. A 1950s-era military radar console had the retro sci-fi look of any number of spaceship control panels seen in old SF movies or TV shows. Très cool! There were displays of old radios and television sets. record players and high-fi stereo consoles, CBC broadcast microphones, early video-gaming systems, and common household items such as a barrel-like clothes washing machine, with a set of rollers mounted atop through which the wet clothes were run to squeeze as much water out before the wash was hung up to dry on a clothesline. Several of our older members recalled such washers from their childhoods.

The science behind the technology on display was outlined in a variety of interactive stations.

The CSTM's showcase exhibition this summer is The Art of the Brick, a Lego exhibition featuring the work of renowned Lego builder/artist Nathan Sawaya. His original pieces, as well as recreations of world famous works of art like Michelangelo's David, Da Vinci's Mona Lisa, and Van Gogh's Starry Night, greatly impressed our group. His largest sculpture was a full-sized T-Rex skeleton, made of over 80,000 bricks!

Those MonSFFen gathered in advance of the regular meeting chose from a list of five so-themed films—the classic Day the Earth Stood Still (1951), the quintessential '50s flying saucer flick Earth vs. The Flying Saucers (1956), the Canadian-made stinker Starship Invasions (1977), a TV movie, Roswell (1994), and the creepy alien abduction tale Dark Skies (2013). Folk opted for the thrills of Ray Harryhausen's stop-motion saucers in Earth vs. the Flying Saucers, rating this B-movie a serviceable actioner with a competent script and cast that benefitted from Harryhausen's superior special effects magic; his scenes of saucers attacking and the destruction of Washington, D. C. landmarks were the highlights. An enjoyable, if not exceptional, movie.

Keith Braithwaite opened the meeting proper with a PowerPoint presentation on the influences UFOlogy has had on sci-fi movies and TV shows, like the aforementioned Earth vs. the Flying Saucers, which drew on real reported UFO sightings for elements of its story, and for the designs of the featured flying saucers. Keith cited other films, and TV series like The Invaders (1967-'68), Project U.F.O. (1978-'79), Dark Skies (1996-'97) and, of course, the X-Files (1993-2002; 2016, 2018), all of which, to varying degrees, tapped into actual UFO lore in scripting their stories. The late start to the meeting necessitated a shortened presentation, unfortunately, so Keith has more on UFO-themed films and TV series in reserve for another time.

After the mid-meeting break, Danny Sichel was up with his talk on translation as featured in sci-fi. Such devices as Star Trek's universal translator, Star Wars' protocol droids, the Babel fish of Hitchhiker's Guide to the Universe, and others allow us to speak to aliens, understand what they are saying, although not always with complete accuracy. Danny outlined some of sci-fi's most interesting examples of translation methods, and the problems of the inevitable mistranslations or misunderstandings that are bound to crop up from time to time. He noted that an alien species, quite possibly, may not communicate with sounds, as we do, and that would certainly complicate our understanding each other!

We thank Keith and Danny for their presentations, and all who helped to plan and run our May 2018 meeting.

Briefly:

► The always opinionated, irascible, irreverent Harlan Ellison passed away on June 28 at age 84. Beyond SF/F literature, Ellison's prodigious talents extended into film and television, comics, criticism, and as an essayist. His awards are numerous and include multiple Hugos and Nebulas, several Edgar Allan Poe and Bram Stoker Awards, as well as honours for his Outer Limits and Star Trek screenplays. Among his best known works: A Boy and his Dog, I Have No Mouth, and I Must Scream, City on the Edge of Forever (Star Trek), Demon with a Glass Hand (Outer Limits), Jeffty is Five, The Beast that Shouted Love at the Heart of the World, and 'Repent, Harlequin!' Said the Ticktockman.

Briefly:

► MonSFFA extends sincere condolences to club member Alexis Despland and his family, who on July 31 suffered the loss of Michel Despland, Alexis' beloved father, a professor emeritus in the study of religions and cultures at Concordia University. He was 82.

► Guardians of the Galaxy Vol. 3 writer/director James Gunn has been fired! Gunn helmed the first two Guardians of the Galaxy films for Marvel and was working on pre-production for the third when "incendiary" online remarks he made nearly a decade ago, joking tactlessly about pedophilia and rape, surfaced, prompting Marvel's parent company, Disney, to sack him. Gunn has apologized for his comments, declaring that he's not the selfstyled outrageous provocateur he was then, and that he's matured. But Disney insists that the quips in question are simply "indefensible" and incompatible with the company's values. Disney is standing by its decision, despite lobbying in favour of reinstating Gunn on the part of Guardians cast members and others.

► Actress Ruby Rose will play Kate Kane/Batwoman in an Arrow/Flash/Supergirl crossover special scheduled to air in December on the CW. A Batwoman series may follow in 2019. While attending the recent premiere of The Meg, the gay actress became quite emotional at news of her casting, explaining that as a young girl, she never had TV characters, let alone a superhero, with whom she could identify. She is thrilled to be portraying one of DC's few lesbian protagonists, and in the bargain providing a role model for today's gay youth. Rose is one of the stars of The Meg, a big, dumb monster movie currently in theatres featuring a Megalodon, that being a giant prehistoric shark.

► A Buffy the Vampire Slayer reboot is apparently in the works at Fox, and original Buffy series creator Joss Whedon is involved. Early reports suggested that this "inclusive" contemporary Buffy TV show will cast a black actress in the role made famous by Sarah Michelle Gellar. However, more recent speculation has it that this black Buffy will be introduced not as Buffy, but in fact as a new slayer within the established Buffyverse. No word on casting yet, or on whether original cast members will appear, although James "Spike" Marsters has said he'd be up for it if called upon. Some fans of the original are wondering aloud whether a reboot is really necessary, or could live up to the well-regarded original, and further, questioning the seeming insinuation that the original was not inclusive, given the presence of such black characters as Kendra and Sineya (the First Slayer), and gay characters Willow and Tara.

Series lead Andrew "Rick Grimes" Lincoln confirmed at San Diego Comic-Con last month that he will be leaving The Walking Dead at the conclusion of this upcoming ninth season of the zombie-apocalypse drama.
Patrick Stewart will reprise his role as Jean-Luc Picard in a planned new Star Trek series for the CBS All Access streaming service. No premiere date yet.
Climate change is allowing flora and fauna acclimated to more southern climes to now migrate north, including the venomous Northern Black Widow Spider! Typically found in the U.S. and Southern Ontario, the Northern Black Widow is now encroaching on Quebec's southern border and will soon make its way to Montreal and environs! "These words he speaks are true, we're all humanary stew, if we don't pledge allegiance to... The Black Widow!" No word on whether this Black Widow is affiliated with the Avengers. Or radioactive.

► Canadians reported 1101 UFO sightings last year, and at 518, Quebec topped all Canadian provinces and territories with nearly half of those, according to a Manitoba-based survey by UFOlogy Research, which estimates that about eight percent of these sightings might be classified as unexplained. In authoring its annual survey, the group collates data from numerous sources, including UFO organizations, government files, media reports, and internet postings. With 74 sightings, Montreal led Toronto, Vancouver and other Canadian cities reporting UFOs in 2017. In an unrelated statistic, Canadians spend annually upwards of \$22 billion on alcohol, and \$5.5 billion on marijuana.

▶ President Trump recently announced that the U.S. will immediately begin to organize and establish an American Space Force! This proposed sixth branch of the U.S. military would be tasked with defending the nation, protecting American assets in space, and furthering the exploration of space. Trump stated that in terms of defending America, "it is not enough to merely have an American presence in space, we must have American *dominance* in space!" Claiming that the future belongs "totally to us (Americans)," he envisions building "gleaming new spaceships," opining that "economically, militarily, scientifically, in *every* way, there's no place like space!" The idea was met with both interest and skepticism.

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was robust and the print-version of Warp 101 was available for pick-up.

The afternoon's agenda, however, had to be modified as we found ourselves without our video/slide projection system!

We opened with a discussion of favourite sci-fi book and magazine cover artists, with Cathy Palmer-Lister, Danny Sichel, and Keith Braithwaite highlighting a number of illustrators— Michael Whelan, Vincent Di Fate, Norman Saunders, Wayne Barlowe—and passing around the room books featuring their artwork for all to see. The audience chimed in with their own favourite artists, among them Frank Frazetta, the Brothers Hildebrandt, and Frank Kelly Freas.

Keith also mentioned that often, one can get an idea of what a book is about based on common visual tropes utilized on the jacket by marketing and art directors. High fantasy book covers tend to feature dragons, wizards, warriors clad in medieval garb on horseback, for example. Science fiction books feature spaceships and planet-scapes as shorthand for what's to be found between the covers, or astronauts in jetpacks brandishing ray-guns. A book splashing its author's name in large, bold text across a minimalist cover illustration is usually trying to sell the reader on that author.

François Menard followed with an extensive treatise on Sword and Sorcery, a subset of the larger fantasy genre, highlighting the bloody adventures of sword-wielding warriors epitomized by Robert E. Howard's Kull the Conqueror and Conan the Barbarian. François was our guide through a history of this subgenre in both literature, and film and television. Minus our usual projector, we nevertheless managed to show some of the trailers François had brought along, albeit on a small laptop screen!

We apologize for our logistical oversights!

The planned slideshow tour of Ticonderoga, New York's astonishingly accurate recreation of the original starship Enterprise television sets, finally, was postponed. This presentation has been rescheduled for our September 8 meeting (see Events Column).

MonSFFA Membership Cards to be Discontinued

With the club's current stack of blank membership cards now exhausted, a discussion ensued at our August 18 meeting on whether or not to commit budget monies to the printing of a fresh batch, or indeed whether to maintain the practise of issuing membership cards at all.

It was noted that our membership cards were originally designed to allow members to take advantage of certain discounts at local Genre bookstores and hobby shops offered through our now-defunct MonSFFA Discount Program. But each and every one of the participating merchants—at peak, the program sported some 15 vendors—has gone out of business, having, one by one, closed throughout the 1990s and early-2000s as Montreal's retail landscape underwent major upheaval.

After a brief discussion, it was the unanimous thinking of the assembled membership to discontinue the practice of issuing club membership cards. It was proposed that perhaps a digital version of a MonSFFA membership card might be posted on the club's Web site and made available to any members who wished to download and print out at home their own copy.

Another thought was that a small, inexpensive but cool "gift" item be stocked in bulk, and one each given to new and renewing members upon payment of their annual fees. This proposal is under consideration and has not yet been approved for implementation, however.

Briefly:

► Production on Guardians of the Galaxy, Vol. 3 has been delayed and the film's planned release postponed as a new director is sought to replace the franchise's recently fired architect, James Gunn. Writer/director Gunn was axed by Marvel Studios' parent company, Disney, after decade-old inflammatory online jokes about pedophilia and rape attributed to him were uncovered. According to some reports, right-wing bloggers gleefully brought to light Gunn's admittedly tasteless remarks in retaliation for his outspoken criticism of President Trump's administration!

► Variety reports that former Doctor Who star Matt Smith will appear in a key role in Star Wars: Episode IX, currently filming. He's British, unquestionably, so it's a good bet that he'll be playing a villain! Also among new cast members are Keri Russell (The Americans) and Dominic Monaghan (Lord of the Rings, Lost). ▶ Patrick Stewart's new CBS All Access Star Trek television series will see him reprise the role of Jean-Luc Picard. The narrative is set 25 years after the events of Star Trek: Nemesis and will focus on the next phase of the iconic character's life, in which Picard, apparently, is no longer a Starfleet captain. The show is untitled, absent any significant plot details, and without a premiere date at this time. ▶ Led by a Canadian scientist, a research team at Trent University in Peterborough, Ontario, has demonstrated a means of dramatically accelerating the formation of magnesite, a CO₂-absorbing mineral that forms in nature over a period of hundreds to thousands of years. But by using polystyrene microspheres as a catalyst, the production of magnesite crystals is accomplished in just 72 days! The process occurs at room temperature and is therefore energy efficient. And the polystyrene microspheres remain chemically unaffected, and so can be reused. Scaled up, this method, then, could potentially help to slow global warming by sequestering atmospheric carbon-dioxide. CO₂ levels have risen dramatically in the past century, driven by human activity, and carbon-dioxide is, of course, a greenhouse gas that contributes to global warming.

SEPTEMBER CLUB MEETING

Cathy Palmer-Lister was up next with a brief talk on the subject of space junk. Abandoned satellites and old rocket boosters, not to mention the bits and pieces of damaged or destroyed man-made objects floating about in random orbits around the Earth, has become quite the problem! We are littering our space lanes with the detritus of past space missions and endangering our modern satellite communications systems and spacebased scientific research platforms, like the International Space Station.

As larger pieces of junk collide with others and break up into smaller fragments, more and more junk results, the scraps propelled into ever more haphazard trajectories. Cathy offered a number of charts detailing the sheer number of pieces floating around up there at various altitudes.

She also noted a few of the proposed solutions to the problem, which include the use of recoverable and reusable boosters in future, and the deploying of large nets to capture the free-flying debris.

The meeting closed with Keith Braithwaite and Lindsay Brown's slideshow of their trip last year to Ticonderoga, New York, to visit replicas of the original Star Trek sets housed in a nondescript building in the middle of this small, Adirondack town.

A dedicated group of Star Trek fans, guided by a copy of the original blueprints of the sets they'd obtained from a Hollywood professional who had worked on the Gene Roddenberry-created TV series in the mid-1960s, built these replicas initially for the group's ambitious Star Trek: New Voyages Web series. Today, their faithful recreation is an officially sanctioned tourist attraction.

Keith and Lindsay pronounced their immersive experience of walking the decks of the Enterprise, from Transporter Room to Sick Bay to Engineering to the famous Bridge and more, as the closest one could come to actually boarding the fabled, fictional starship! Running through hundreds of photos and a few quick videos they'd shot, the two described their adventure, pointing out the meticulously attention to detail displayed by the folk who researched and erected a near-perfect duplicate of the original television studio sets.

Well worth the two-hour drive to Ticonderoga for any Star Trek fan!

We thank Sylvain, Cathy, Keith, and Lindsay for their contributions to the afternoon's programming, and acknowledge, too, those who helped to plan and run this meeting.

Club Elections

MonSFFA begins a new year with the election of its Executive Committee for that year. These elections always take place at our first meeting of the year, in January, and are officially confirmed by the following meeting, in February. All MonSFFA members in good standing, having paid in full their annual membership fees, are encouraged to participate.

MonSFFA elects annually a president, vice-president, and treasurer—who together form the Executive Committee—and charges them with the responsibility of running the club on behalf of the membership. These executives recruit advisors and appoint officers to assist them in carrying out this responsibility.

Our sitting Executive is as follows: Cathy Palmer-Lister, president; Keith Braithwaite, vice-president; Sylvain St-Pierre, treasurer.

Briefly:

► Space is at a premium this issue so suffice it report that our October 20 meeting began with the year's final installment of Saturday Sci-Fi Cinema Matinée, featuring, for Halloween, a choice of the worst of the worst in vintage sci-fi/horror, including the "classic" Plan 9 From Outer Space! Folks reviewed Attack of the Giant Leeches (1959), commenting on the low-rent production values and hard-to-ignore errors of this so-bad-it's-good flick. Two excellent presentations followed, well researched and detailed, the first by Sylvain St-Pierre on the Golden Age of the Pulps, tracing the evolution of colourful pulp sci-fi magazines as far back as the so-called Penny Dreadfuls of 19th century Britain. Adam Lawrence was up next, offering a treatise on the "family resemblances" of changeling legends and SF/F, outlining the folklore from which stem changeling myths, and the ways in which SF/F writers have tapped into and adapted these to their own purposes, citing numerous examples. Many thanks to Sylvain, Adam, and all the usual suspects!

► Stan Lee has died. The comics superstar, co-creator of many of Marvel's most popular superheroes—Spider-Man, The Fantastic Four, The X-Men, Ironman, The Incredible Hulk, Black Panther, and Daredevil, to name a few—had recently been ill and was taken to hospital in Los Angeles early Monday morning, November 12, where he ultimately passed away. He was 95. His characters live on not only in comic books, but on television and in the lucrative entertainment juggernaut that is the Marvel Cinematic Universe. To the delight of fans, Stan Lee cameoed in each of these Marvel movies.

▶ We reported last issue that Walking Dead star Andrew Lincoln's character, Rick Grimes, was to be killed off. Well, not quite, it turns out! In a recent episode, he seemingly died in an explosion but unknown to the show's other characters, he has, in fact survived and was whisked away aboard the mysterious helicopter that has shown up sporadically of late. He won't return to the TV series but apparently, Rick Grimes will appear again in several Walking Dead movies!

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
