

Meditations on the Pandemic

Slowly but surely, we are reaching the end of this pandemic. Most of us in Canada, at least in British Columbia, have had at least one vaccination. I have had one AstraZeneca vaccination and expect to have my second one, sooner rather than later.

But I still wonder if the new normal, after COVID-19, will be quite the same as the old. We have had a succession of novel contagious infections coming out of unexpected places in the last several decades: SARS, Legionnaire's Disease, AIDS, Ebola, and now COVID-19. You have to wonder if face masks and hand sanitizer, limited travel and even limited public gatherings, will become permanent fixtures in the future ... Little wonder if some people refuse to believe the pandemics are real: they're so massive, and *inconvenient*, a change from the "normal".

In some ways, staying home practically all day, every day, and not visiting anyone or going out, has been a restful, contemplative time. It has been worthwhile to weigh my past and present, and pick out the real issues.

In other ways, isolation was not edifying. It is all too easy to become undisciplined, not to extend my skills or to learn anything new, not to exercise, or to let isolation depress me.


I find myself brooding on the failure to convey to fans my concerns about conventional conrunning, at least in the 1980s; or on the media's complete silence about the Belgian world domination plot; or the continuing threat to Canada represented by the Cult of Kali, and the terrorist cults it sets up and manipulates around the world. The company of my cat has been a great comfort.

Maybe I just need full-time work instead of the part-time gigs I've got.

For some years I have had an e-book titled *The Last Centurion*, by John Ringo, which was written about a decade ago but comes rather close to describing our pandemic. There are major differences in his parallel story universe, of course: Ringo describes a much more virulent pandemic, with a 30% to 60% fatality rate; a global climate change, not global warming but global cooling, is being ignored by a deluded media; his U.S. President is not a conservative caricature named Trump, but a liberal caricature named Warrick; and the virus and the president between them wreak famine and economic upheaval on the U.S. The rest of the world ends up ... rearranged, politically, due to results of the pandemic, the climate change, and the consequent military clashes.

I feel pretty fortunate after reading this sort of thing.

Paul Carpentier took me aside at one VCON to point out that, for all my kvetching about the things people <u>will not</u> tell me clearly, I persist in not telling *them* what I still don't know.

Fair enough. Here's a list:

- I don't understand colour matching, whether in choosing clothes or decorating a home.
- I don't know what hats are for, unless they're for the same purpose as umbrellas, and I have *never* learned the function of a tie.
- What is your explanation for lawns?
- Is there any excuse for high heels? Or toxic cosmetics?
- If shirt pockets aren't there to hold pens and Kleenex, then dammit, what *are* they for?
- I don't understand how I fail job interviews, or keep losing jobs. Is it body odour? A disagreeable voice?
- I don't recognize when (if ever) women come on to me, or when and what is an acceptable approach to a woman. So I gave up. I mean, who *dies* of being single?
- I don't understand what you can say or can't say, what you can do or can't do, either in public or in private.


- *Don't* tell me it's all situational and depends on the people you're with; you have rules you won't admit, or you don't even know about them.
- I don't understand people who *won't* or *can't* **say**, directly and clearly and concisely, what they want from me. Since indirection and nuance are the only ways some subjects are approached ... this cuts me out of a lot.
- I don't understand why many English speakers often begin a sentence with "they" or "it's" or "there", and if they even *remember* to define who They are, what It is, or where There is, it can take the speaker more than half an hour to get around to it.
- Further, I don't understand why some people whether they're co-workers, fans on a con committee, or family members seem to assume their listeners *already* know what subject they're talking about and why they're talking about it, and get all huffy if you ask them to explain their statements, questions, or instructions.
- Just for example, I don't understand why some parents expect their children to *just know*, without being told, any number of social rules and mores and taboos, even the elaborate Edwardian social code that died generations ago, and accuse children of having no "common sense", when their rules have *no* sense, and *aren't* common. And I am outraged at the silent contempt I got from family members. Was that just my family, or is this a widespread syndrome, and a public mental health issue?
- I don't understand why obviously unqualified people are allowed to marry, let alone raise children. It's like letting obviously unqualified people drive. (Oh, wait, British Columbia discovered several years ago that there were thousands of obviously unqualified people driving in the province, and just let it go, didn't they?) If we demanded a level of competence from people and they had to qualify for licenses before they formed families, maybe we wouldn't have homeless throwaway children in overpopulated megacities today.
- I don't understand why teachers decree there should be no fighting in schoolyards just as if children weren't instinctively compelled to establish a pecking order, like all vertebrates and then, if you please, they turn a blind eye to schoolyard bullies, but come down like a ton of cement on their victims. At least the cowardly despots who ran my grade schools behaved that way.
- I don't understand why grade schools spend ten years subliminally teaching pupils they have to toe the line, follow bureaucratic procedure (even when it's pointless), then barely start to open course options to them in grade school ... while post-secondary institutions run on the opposite assumption, that you already know in your early twenties what you want to do, or be.

- I don't understand or at least, I didn't why teenagers and twenty-somethings are expected to make crucial life decisions, with little life experience or perspective. (In my late twenties or early thirties I *finally* got a clue that teenagers are expected to feel like invincible, immortal know-it-alls. It was then I realized how alien you humans are.)
- I don't understand why high school graduates and dropouts are supposed to *just know*, without being told, that jobhunting is a crapshoot, like being an artist or a musician or an actor or a freelance writer; that you have to expect a low percentage of hits and a high percentage of misses, so you have to keep submitting your resumé without expecting (or needing) acceptance.
- I don't understand why we were supposed to *just know* how much to spend and how much to save, whatever our incomes.
- I don't understand why one Canadian bureaucracy advocates moving to Canada, to professionals overseas such as doctors and engineers, when professional associations in Canada don't recognize their qualifications.
- I don't understand why American English started to treat "liberal" as a dirty word when the USA is *supposed* to be a liberal democracy, as opposed to (say) an absolute monarchy, or an *un*-representative republic.
- I never understood where to invest time and money and effort on expanding my saleable skills. But then, I never understood that we were supposed to have future plans, even a life planned out, as early as high school graduation.
- I don't understand why the investor classes expect middle and lower classes to be adaptable to economic changes *without warning*, or without understanding how to adapt.
- I don't understand why a long life is supposed to be much better than a short one, if it just means longer illness, disability and financial desperation.
- I don't entirely understand the urge to marry and procreate. The urge to find someone to care for, that much I understand. But there are *already* a lot of children, of all ages, who have to manage without parents not just cute and cuddly babies under one year old. Why not adopt before procreating?
- Whenever the news reminds me that the patriarchy still exists, or racism or class structure, I am mildly surprised; but then, I have always been about as hermitic as urban life allows. It puzzled me to hear about the rise of anti-Asian racism, especially here in Canada ... until my slow mental processes connected it to the current pandemic, which appeared to come out of China. When the Spanish Flu epidemic appeared in 1918, was there

a backlash against Spanish-speakers everywhere? It would make about as much sense.

Of course, I have figured out some things by now.

- I didn't understand for a long time that suicide was considered shameful. Sinful, that is. I got the fact that some people find life more than they can take, so they take their lives. I got the fact that this traumatizes everybody else, so I worked out that this is a bad thing to do to others. The rest of the baggage escaped me.
- Similarly, I didn't quite get the horror attached to cannibalism; like a lot of life, it was on the other side of the television screen, so to speak. Cannibalism happens when people are driven to it, that much I understood from stories about planes that go down in the bush. Assuming the role of a hard-grained Canadian (as if I weren't a lifetime city boy), I would probably say I wouldn't commit cannibalism "unless there was nothing better to eat". You may laugh now. That was a joke. Is funny. Is make ha-ha.
- I didn't understand, for a while, why genetically modified organisms are automatically assumed to be evil. Granted, there's a right way, a wrong way, and a corporate way to do this stuff; and firms like Monsanto seem mainly determined to patent and monopolize all the food species on the globe, so they peddle the products that will serve that goal. Why fix on that goal? Because they can.
- I think I understand why fandom ceased to be a dispersed community, or consist of fans of reasoned speculation. Fandom became more and more populous, so fans could find enough of a hobby group in their locality; there was less and less ridicule of SF and fantasy as the genres became popular, so there was less urgency about finding people you could talk to; and, sadly, there is less and less intellectual challenge in what passes for science fiction and fantasy.
- I think I understand why people run conventions the way they do ... they generally want to do *their own thing, their own way*. Even experience will not teach them that some ideas of conrunning simply will not work; only economics or the rumour mill will force them not to try funding another con entirely on preregistrations, or fast-talking their hotel and their guests of honour and their artists and dealers all at once. Until I worked that out, I didn't understand why obvious incompetents, con artists, and sometimes criminals were repeatedly allowed in the field of conrunning.

2020 N3F AMATEUR SHORT STORY CONTEST

Story Contest Rules and Entry Blank

Now and then, it has been suggested to open the N3F Amateur Short Story Contest to professional writers, writers who have had one or two sales. I've never favored this. It is my opinion that we want new blood. We want to reward the new kids on the block. To be blunt, we want writing that is not that good. We want stories from people who don't know their object from their subject, who don't know where commas go, and who use apostrophes to denote plurals — but who have a story to tell. I want stories from guys nobody's ever heard of...but in the years ahead, we will. Those who are already successful don't need the encouragement of our little contest. If they were to enter the contest, the danger is that they'd win, every time, and crowd out the promising newcomer.

- 1. This contest is open to all amateur writers in the field, regardless of whether they're members of the National Fantasy Fan Federation. For the purposes of this contest, we define an amateur as someone who has sold no more than two (2) stories to professional science fiction or fantasy publications.
- 2. Stories entered in the contest must be original, unpublished, not longer than 8,500 words in length—and must be related to the science fiction, fantasy, or similar genres in the opinion of the judge.
- 3. Email attachments of Word documents are acceptable for submission. Manuscripts on paper should be typed, single sided on 8 1/2"-by- 11" white paper, double spaced, with pages numbered. The name of the author should not appear anywhere on the manuscript to ensure impartial judging. Photocopies are acceptable, if they are of good quality. Computer printouts must be legible.

- 6. There are no entry fees.
- 7. Cash prizes totaling \$100 will be awarded as follows: First prize is \$50, second \$30, and third \$20. Honorable mentions and semi-finalists will receive a certificate of award.

This review and invitation will only occur after contest winners have been announced, so it can have no effect on the contest outcome.
- 11. The NSF may want to publish an electronic book including top entries from one or more years of publication.
