

"Little Blue Books were a series of small, staple-bound booklets published from 1919 through 1978 by the Haldeman-Julius Publishing Company of Girard, Kansas. The booklets were extremely popular, and sold 200-500 million copies over the lifetime of the series.

"Emanuel Haldeman-Julius and his author wife, Marcet, set out to publish small low price paperback pocketbooks intended for the working class as well as for the "educated" class. Their goal was to get works of literature, a wide range of ideas, common sense knowledge, and various points of view out to as large an audience as possible. ..."

In the latest issue of *Christian New Age Quarterly*, editor Catherine Groves considers the difference between our waking and dreaming lives. Considering that people spend about a third of their lifespans asleep, and even people who report having no dreams show all the neurological signs of dreaming sleep, you might well ask what the significance of dreams are in our lives, even though they are largely dismissed.

For my part, I regularly have lucid dreams, in which I make decisions and take an active part and carry on reasoned conversations, or what I consider reasoned speech. Do you have lucid dreams? (Of course, I have to confess that taking an active part disrupts the scenarios and the characters, and usually aborts whatever passes for continuity in my dreams.)

I keep hearing these stories from family, and friends, and correspondents, about their adventures in Doctorland. Most of these stories tend to confirm the biases I am forming about medical industries – namely, that hospitals and clinics are overburdened, doctors are overworked, and the pressure is great to limit treatment to dispensing prescribed medications. (The situation is the same but exacerbated, in Canada and particularly in my province.)

Defining science fiction, or fantasy, has always been difficult. I would merely say that SF – and fantasy, and some kinds of horror – includes any stories in which the world we consider "normal" is changed, either subtly or grossly, slowly or abruptly, by human action or by natural processes. The fact that science fiction seems to have been motivated by the continuing social changes that technological innovations brought about only introduced *one* type of science fiction; we now have several other types involving unforeseen natural disasters, unpredictable mutations and transformations of humanity, interventions by refugee gods, disgruntled parahumans demanding equal welfare rights, robot uprisings, returning intelligent dinosaurs who are just *appalled* at what we've done to this nice planet, and aliens trying to sell us on a logical design for living.

How to Human: I well understand that question is getting off on the wrong foot. At least, at my age, I do. Life is a complex chaotic phenomenon and we just have to surf it, as surfers ride their waves. We lend meaning to life by creating musical comedy. Or maybe that's the purpose of civilization. Whatever.

I mean, the right thing to do when a stranger abruptly attacks you, or approaches you with an opportunity too good to be true, or a woman

becomes exceedingly friendly very quickly, seems to be a different thing, on every other occasion. The right plan for a science fiction convention, one year, seems not to be a success the next year. And don't get me started on Canadian politics and economics. It is as if the laws of cause and effect keep changing, when people are involved. Should I carry a pair of dice to help me make decisions?

One of my persistent intuitions is that both dystopias and utopias kind of *miss the target*. Aside from some countries at any given time, we are usually not headed for disaster and destruction. Neither are we headed for "perfection," if that's even a meaningful word. (And yes, I already know that "utopia" actually meant "nowhere," but it somehow got transmogrified in popular speech to mean "an allegedly perfect society.") In fact I think "perfection" is neither a word capable of being meaningful, nor is perfection by anyone's definition attainable in the real world.

In my terms, even if you could design societies and people's responses to situations, and making needs and resources, situations and responses fit each other, some pieces of the puzzle would always stick out unresolved from one end of the puzzle or another.

Someone should have given Plato a Jenga puzzle.
