


Maybe this is worthwhile in itself. Since the constructions I write up are not reliably interesting to others, I should be content to please myself.

(After comments on the Chengdu Worldcon) If Berlin had won the 1940 WorldCon...

Thanks to a war, if you were not a German, an Italian, a Russian, a Swede, or a resident of Eastern Europe, getting to Berlin there would be nearly

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impossible. Englishmen and their allies were just out. An Irishman could have flown to Portugal but there is then a war zone in the way. An American could have travelled by neutral ship to neutral Turkey and then taken the rail line to Berlin, ship to Persia and then some rail lines west,

... Ship to Vladivostok and then the trans-Siberian railroad to Moscow and other rail lines to Berlin...all very difficult. Also, an SF con where the con hotel is at some risk of being bombed by the RAF would be...different.

So I would say that a 1940 WorldCon in Berlin would have greatly distressed American fen, much more than Chengdu2023 currently distresses Americans. Don't worry, though. If Beijing invades the Republic of China, there will be a coastal and air blockade of China, and legal restrictions on Americans going to Chengdu, at which point the distress will be equal.

Ah, Corflu Pangloss...so many places I'd like to go, and so little money to get me there, so I've become quite used to Just Not Going. A fair history of Canadian fandom, which never did get together at any point, due to a surfeit of geography. After the 80s, we need to have a little more research.

((I wasn't sure for a minute whether you meant a Canadian fanhistory volume was never assembled, or whether Canadian fandom never quite united into one fan community. As to a Canadian fanhistory, Taral Wayne put together his several articles in a volume titled The Great White Zine, now archived at eFanzines.com. I am assembling other materials into another volume now. (Title undecided.) As you say, more research after the 80s is needed: a LOT more research, I would say. I am tempted to leave that to a subsequent volume.))

What Do We Learn From Fanzines? We learn that people find out that to be a part of things, they must participate, and even then, things are not guaranteed. We can contribute, but some may not want what you have to give. And that while our intentions may be the best, there are some who are eager to be offended. Much of that applies to fandom as a whole, but all we can do is do our best, hope that what we provide is appreciated, and watch out for that eager offence.

((I became pretty disappointed in fandom – hell, in humanity – and now, I am trying to accept that people are going to be as ignorant and incompetent outside of their paid work, or their usual rounds, as they feel they can afford. Not a conscious decision, just the ordinary habit of aping other people's ordinary behaviour.))

((I only have an old email for him that doesn't work. I must pursue the Facebook connection.))

Amazing Stories news...I am currently working with Kermit Woodall on seeing where the magazine can go, and I am going through a lot of short-short fiction to see what we might like to buy. Steve stepped away from the publisher's position, which he gave to Kermit, and I got the position of editor-in-chief, I think, mostly because I was one of the last few left, and I showed some interest in the position. Lots left to do, more stories to read, and I will soon be sending a lot of fiction off to our slush readers, and see what they like.

It is a shame that When Words Collide in Calgary will have its last convention in 2023, but most Canadian conventions like this seem to be going away, through the greying of fandom we all discuss. We need to have a look...when WWC is done, what is left? Keycon and Pemmi-con in Winnipeg, and Can-con in Ottawa...any more?

((There are many more conventions held right across Canada, going by the online research I sometimes do; but they are overwhelmingly anime conventions, comics conventions, gaming conventions, media gateshows ... you see the trend. This is a twice-told tale.))

And, I think I am done for the moment. I am trying my best to sharpen my time management skills so I can get done all I need to do for Amazing, and still have the time to write some letters of comment, edit other books I might take on, and get done all the responsibilities I have at home. One Way to Look at It #2 (Garth Spencer)

Because I'm a heathen – in fact, I am the Clerk of the British Columbia Heathen Freehold – I receive some eccentric emails. One of the more eccentric things I receive are "Declarations of Deeds," news that one or another new heathen is an electronic signatory to an anti-racist declaration, specifically of their universalist beliefs, as a worshipper of the pre-Christian Germanic gods.

Why would this declaration be necessary? Because the revival of this form of paganism

originated within pan-Germanic nationalism in the 1930s – at a time, and among people steeped in racism, that's why. And now it seems necessary again.

These emails I receive come in great numbers at unpredictable times. The impression is that a lot of racism is rearing its ugly head again – not just in our nations at large, but in pagan circles specifically.

There are openly racist, white-supremacist heathen organizations. There are also heathen organizations that claim to be "folkish", that is, they simply think only people of Germanic descent should properly be inspired to join this kind of worship. Then there are universalist groups, such as the one I am in, which assert anyone of any background may be inspired to worship and be true to the Aesir and Vanir.

Of course all of this has to look pretty eccentric, in a rational-materialist time and country, but so do televangelists, and flaky right-wing extremist governments.
