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Gang War in Detroit Ended

The gang war in the urban area known as Detroit has been ended, according to the captain of the Freelan National Guard stationed in the area. The last members of the two warring gangs were rounded up last night by Guardsmen, local Peacekeepers, and a group put together by local businessmen and property owners.

The gang members are being held in a fenced area that is targeted by those businessmen and property owners for revitalization and are being given the choice of being hired by the companies helping with the revitalization or being exiled from Freelan. The construction companies will be training any newly hired former gang members.

Storm Damage in Dallas

In Dallas, Sky Tower, which had its grand opening in May, suffered minor damage when the navsys on a DroneCar failed, causing the vehicle to bump into a glass side of the structure. Architect Ted Waters, who had designed and overseen the construction of the tower, commented that the special glass used had kept damage from being more severe.

"It also blocks excess heat and can be turned translucent or opaque as the people inside require," he added.

The building owners, Chester and Veda Anne Laramie, stated that the damage would be repaired quickly. They have chosen not to file suit against the DroneCar operator or against GeoMark, the makers of the navsys used in those vehicles and owned by Mark Heddleston with headquarters in Benton Valley just north of Hammil Valley, birthplace of Freelan.



Optimism for Upcoming Harvest

When asked if members missed farming subsidies, the spokesman for the Freelan Farmers Coalition stated,



We can work our own deals. The coalition was formed to facilitate that."

When pressed for details on negotiations for trade, the spokesman said simply that they were ongoing.



The Freelan Gazette Book Review: *The Ceres Stratagem*

This is the first book by authors A.C. Cargill and John E. Dick in the series of novels focused on the fictional country of Freelan. I was honored to read a pre-publication copy of the manuscript.



The World

The authors have set up a world where people live in true freedom without laws but not without order. Residents of Freelan (called Freelanians) can make choices for their lives, but along with those choices, they face the consequences. There is no "crime" as we know the use of that word. There are only "violations" of individual rights, including property rights. For example, if you steal, that is a violation of property rights. Assuming that the property owner doesn't catch you right there and you get away, the Peacekeepers (formerly called "police") will seek you and, if they find you, take back the stolen items or bring you to court where you will be made to pay for the items plus the cost of the Peacekeepers and the court. There are also no laws banning certain behaviors such as prostitution, swearing in public, being drunk in public, or "hate speech."

The Conflict

Elitists of the world want to bring Freelanians under their thumb. The scheme is to cause a catastrophe that threatens the world and blame it on "those chaotic freedom lovers" in Freelan. The world's largest cargo ship, named *Ceres*, is the conduit for this plot. The victims are two people who epitomize all for which Freelan stands.

The Characters

The leader of this plot is a financier

named Nikolaos Giannopoulos. He is old and with a brain warped by envy of any successful person, by hatred and fear of other people, and by the idea of his own superiority to the point that he has made repeated efforts to have a superior child. Most of his children, born of a variety of mothers, are normal or even less. But one stands out: his son Adrianos whose mother was Turkish.

Nikolaos' envy and hate is focused on Jim and Rose O'Connell who have been lauded as the founders of Freelan, although they both shy away from that title. And the man that Nikolaos very much wants to be part of his organization is the man to whom the O'Connells have been mentors and more: Peter Thorn.

When Jim and Rose fall into Nikolaos' trap, will Peter be able to save them? Or will he succumb to Nikolaos' temptation of life as one of the superior people in this world?

My Take

An enjoyable read from start to finish without the excess of graphic violence and sex that seems so popular these days. And at the end, I felt a surge of hope for the world.
